

HILLEL HAPPENINGS

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FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

The ark in the Temple Beth Hillel chapel was consecrated Tuesday evening, May 19th, 2015. The Torah was carried from the sanctuary ark by our synagogue president, Steve Brouillard. It was placed in the ark by Cantor Scott Harris. Maddy Brouillard, Michael Swan, Allie Mytych, Lily Greenblott, Jacob Chaimovitch and Abby Castonguay and Rabbi Glickman read parts of the Ten Commandments, with Becky McCann and Jennifer Perosky doing the aliyah.

It is fashioned from a portable ark used in the early years of Temple Beth Hillel when we held services at the Wapping Community Church in the 1960's.

Instigated by Cantor Scott Harris, the

ark was renovated. The Castonguay family repaired the hardware and painted it. Jennifer Schwartzman lead the students in decorating it. Rabbi Jeff Glickman provided the Jewish insights and donated the ancient lamp. The Hebrew lettering came from the lettering above the ark in our first building on Foster Street Extension. The wooden letters were taken down when we sold the building. The letters were given gold leaf by Jeff Coho about 1998. The letters spell out "Torah lanu," which means "our Torah."

Based on the Jewish teaching that Torah is light, "Torah orah," the doors have flames. According to mystical tradition, the Torah we have, words written on a parchment scroll, is only a representation of actual Torah. (pg. 3)

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear fellow TBH family member,

As we come to the close of another fiscal year for Temple Beth Hillel, it's time once again to take a hard look at our financial landscape and see where we need to go for next year. I would like to thank the Budget Committee, who took on this difficult job and worked very hard. As part of their research, they examined the last 7 years of budgets. For each of these years, the Budget Committee presented a balanced budget at the congregational meeting. This year is different.

In the past, while the budget we voted on may have been balanced, the reality is that each year we either overestimated revenue, underestimated expenses, or both. This year's budget is an attempt to be more realistic and shows a \$40,000 deficit.

So how can we correct this financial situation? Raising dues could be one option. But, since we have experienced a net loss of 20 members over the past 18 months, the Budget Committee believed that raising dues would only result in more member loss and an additional net loss in revenue.

Instead, we are asking each member to help us balance the budget by increasing their financial commitment (pg. 7) Page 2 June 2015

Actual Torah is the meaning of the words. In heaven, the Torah is written with black fire lettering on a white fire scroll. These two flames capture that. The sides represent the myriads of colors which were created when G-d said, "Let there be light." Just as one candle can give kindle to many others without being diminished in light, so too with Torah. Every time you give it away, you don't lose – you actually gain.

The interior of the ark contains colorful flowers and the Hebrew words, "kehila kedosha." The original ark, made by Betzalel and Oholiav for our wanderings in the desert, contained Moses' manuscripts, the 10 Commandment stones, some manna and Aaron's staff. We are told that it was of wood and continued to blossom.

These flowers represent this miraculous blossoming.

The Hebrew words mean "holy congregation." They were sung, enthusiastically, almost every Sunday by our students. We don't just come together, but we come together for holiness. [The words to the song by Dan Nichols and Michael Moskowitz are included below.]

The eternal light is an actual oil lamp from ancient Israel. It is from the time of the Talmud (Byzantine period about 5th Century CE). Though it is not certain,

the markings suggest that it might have been owned by a Jewish family. The formation of six dots around a center dot hint of the seven branched menorah, or possibly six days of the week and Shabbat. It is currently lit by a small, battery powered LED.

The Torah which was placed in it is several hundred years old and comes from Morocco. It is handwritten on deep brown deerskin, and feels warm and creamy. Because it is so old, parts of it are broken, making it not fit for regular reading as part of services. It is turned to the section in Exodus with the 10 Commandments, we the hope that each year, it be read from. Because it is so fragile, it should not be opened frequently, though it is safe to take it out, while covered, to parade.

It is covered with a piece commissioned and donated by the Wolf/Gatcomb family. The embroidery was made in the early 1990's by Jews of Ethiopia. It is made of about 100,000 stitches and would have taken a skilled artisan two months to make. Very few embroideries of this size were made (maybe two). It was given to us because of the work we did in the early 2000's to help feed over on thousand Jewish children lunches six days a week. The image depicts an Ethiopian synagogue. Their Torah, written with Ethiopic letters, called Geez, is bound in book form. The leader holds the sacred book and is surrounded by men and women of the community. The image alludes to Moses and Miriam and Aaron. Everyone is in awe, and ignores their implements of war to hear the sacred words. Even the angels come by. The roof is marked with a Jewish star and a ladder. The ladder shows that this is the way to heaven. That is a fitting image for our newly consecrated chapel.

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
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NEW MEMBERS

to the extent of their abilities. The TBH Men's Club has already answered the call. The Men's Club Auction this year grossed approximately \$11,000. In addition to the \$2,000 that Men's Club donates each year to the General Fund, they are adding \$10,000. With this one amazing generous act, they have reduced the deficit to \$30,000.

As congregational leaders, I have also approached the current Board and asked for their help. I am confident that they will do as much as they can.

As our spiritual leader, Rabbi Glickman has also recognized the need and stepped forward to help close the gap. Rabbi has offered to work with the Board to increase the effectiveness of their donation. He and Mindy have agreed to match 50% of the Board's total contribution up to \$3,000 in matching funds. That means that if the board is able to raise \$6,000, the total contribution from the whole TBH leadership will be \$9,000. While I do not currently have the specifics regarding the board's portion at this time, I will inform the congregation of the final outcome of this challenge when the numbers have been finalized.

If the congregation votes to pass this budget in its current state, you will receive a pledge form with your July bill where you can determine how much you would like to contribute above your current commitment. I would also encourage you to consider making donations to the General Fund instead of the more specified funds as the year progresses.

If you've read my other article in this month's newsletter or my message in the annual meeting documents, you'll know that they have come up with a solution that's a bit different than in past years. I hope you will all join me in thanking them for a job well done.

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TORAH PORTIONS

Beha'alotcha - Numbers 8:1-12:15 —This portion is jam-packed, telling the story of the consecration of the Levites, the first Passover in the wilderness, the silver trumpets, the cloud of glory, the departure from Sinai, the grumbling in the wilderness, the first Sanhedrin and the punishment of Miriam.

Shelach - Numbers 13:1-15:41 —The Torah reading tells the tragic story of how the spies returned with a bad report about the Land of Promise and influenced the congregation of Israel to rebel against G-d. Thus G-d consigned the generation of Moses to wander in the wilderness for forty years.

Korach — **Numbers 16:1-18:32** — This week's Torah reading tells the story of how Korah led an unsuccessful rebellion against Moses and Aaron. After thwarting the insurrection, G-d confirms Aaron in the priesthood and provides additional legislation regarding priestly and Levitical privileges and responsibilities.

Chukat - Numbers 19:1-22:1 — *Chukat* presents the mysterious laws of the red-heifer ceremony for purification after contact with human death. This reading also contains the story of Moses striking the rock, the stories of the deaths of Aaron and Miriam, and the wars with the Amorites. The portion concludes with the host of Israel encamping on the edge of the Promised Land.
