FROM THE PRESIDENT

It's getting to be that time of year again. As we approach the High Holy Days, I try to take time to look back on the previous year and consider the upcoming possibilities.

As I was looking back, I came across my speech from last year at Rosh Hashanah and recalled from it one of my favorite Hillel quotes **"If I am not for myself, then who will be for me? If I am only for myself, then what am I? If not now, when?"** The interesting thing about this quote, for me, is that it can be applied in different ways at different times. This year, the quote has taken on a somewhat different perspective for me.

Part of our collective past is that Rabbi Glickman has been our spiritual leader for 20 years. I considered how we might be able to celebrate such an extraordinary achievement. There are lots of options - a party, a special Shabbat service, and some type of commemoration. But perhaps a better way to honor 20 years of Rabbi's leadership would be to help ensure the future of TBH for another 20 years. That's no small challenge. We've faced a number of financial issues over the years, and this idea would take a substantial amount of money to become reality. So in looking both back and forward, I wondered if this was a good time to try a major fundraising campaign. That's where Hillel came in. I looked at each part of that quote. "If I am not for myself, then who will be for me?" My TBH family is important to me and if I don't stand up for that and do what needs doing, who will? "If I am only for myself, then what am I?" I could take the easy way out, just get through the year and leave the heavy lifting for the next president and board. Not exactly the best legacy to leave for future generations. Finally, and most prominently, "If not now, when?" If I wait until financial times are "good", then we may never find ourselves on solid financial footing.



NO SMALL CHANGE (CONT. FROM PAGE 1)

So to help celebrate Rabbi Glickman's 20 years at TBH by helping to secure our financial future for at least 20 more, I am kicking off the 2776 TBH **No Small Change** campaign. We're calling it **No Small Change** because no contribution is too small. We can make a big difference if we all work together. The campaign will run from September 1 – October 31.

Like all good campaigns, we've set some goals. There are two primary goals for this one. The first and most important goal is 100% participation from our community. The second goal is a financial one - \$750,000. It's a pretty big number, but I believe that we can make it happen.

You may wonder how this new campaign relates to the annual High Holy Day Appeal and the budget deficit campaign from earlier this year. **No Small Change** is replacing the High Holy Day Appeal for this year, and the budget deficit campaign has come to an end. If we are successful, we will not need to address a budget deficit in the future.

But how we can get 100% participation if there are members of our community who simply don't have the financial ability to contribute more? For those members, there will be alternative, non-monetary contribution methods. For example, they could:

- Pledge to bring 20 new people to services or a TBH event in 5776
- Pledge to attend at least 20 services or events in 5776
- Pledge to volunteer at least 20 hours at TBH in 5776
- Pledge to call at least 20 members to wish them a Happy New Year this High Holy Day season.
- Pledge to stop and pick up 20 pieces of trash around TBH

Along the way to our financial goal, we have defined a number of milestones. Depending on which of the levels we reach by the end of the campaign, we will acknowledge Rabbi's tenure with us in a different way. If we raise at least \$80,000, we will throw a party in Rabbi's honor, open to all members of the congregation free of charge. In addition to the party, depending on the final figure raised, we will do one of the following:

- \$100,000 Name one classroom, office, or conference room of Rabbi's choice in his honor.
- \$250,000 Name one of our two religious school wings for Rabbi.

- \$400,000 Name the social hall for Rabbi.
- \$500,000 Name the Religious School for Rabbi.
- \$750,000 Name the Sanctuary for Rabbi.

In addition to having goals and milestones, we have predetermined some specific uses for the funds raised. Depending on the funding level reached, the TBH board will use the money to fund some or all of the following items that will improve our long-term financial stability:

- Creating a TBH Endowment fund to generate ongoing income for our community.
- Pay off the second mortgage on our building, helping to eliminate the need to service unnecessary debt.
- Seed our building fund, so we can be sufficiently prepared in the event of an unexpected large expense related to building maintenance.
- Create a TBH Religious School Endowment fund to generate ongoing income to help us provide our families with an economical and quality Jewish education for our children.

I look back over the last year at TBH and some of the challenges we've faced and I come away with a sense of accomplishment and confidence. I am confident that together, as a family, we can meet the challenge presented by **No Small Change** and prepare a better future for ourselves and our children.

TORAH PORTIONS

Ki Tavo- Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8 — This Torah portion begins with laws regarding first fruits and tithes. It goes on to discuss covenant renewal, after which Moses recites the blessings guaranteed to Israel for covenant obedience and warns of the curses for apostasy.

Nitzavim - Deuteronomy 29:9-30:20 — In this portion, Moses invites the entire assembly of Israel to take on the covenant. He warns them that if they sin, they will go into exile, but he also predicts that, in the future, they will repent and G-d will return them to the land of Israel.

Vayeilech — **Deuteronomy 31:1-31:30** — In this short portion, Moses commands an assembly for a public Torah reading and covenant renewal once every seven years. He then finishes writing the scroll of the Torah and has it deposited in the Holy of Holies next to the ark of the covenant.

Haazinu - Deuteronomy 32:1-32:52 — This Torah portion is only a single chapter long, and the majority of it consists of the Song of Moses. The Song of Moses is a prophetic oracle warning Israel about apostasy to come and the resulting wrath of G-d. The song looks far into the future, even envisioning the Messianic advent amid rich and frightening apocalyptic imagery. After the conclusion of the song, Moses is told to ascend Mount Nebo and overlook the Promised Land before dying.

JNF AWARD AT TBH

Temple Beth Hillel will receive a Grove Recognition award from JNF during services on October 16 for their continued generosity and commitment.

Ezra Ravins will be the JNF guest speaker for the event. He is a visionary, environmentalist, agriculture expert, and has personal experience in dealing first hand with water and technology in extreme desert conditions.

Ezra is the former Mayor of the Central Arava Regional Council leading a "new generation of pioneers" as they develop Israel's last frontier, the Arava. Since 1980 he has been a farmer, leading the Arava Agricultural Research and Development Department at the Central Arava Regional Council and served the Israeli Foreign Ministry as the manager of the Arava Medfly Eradication Project.

Ezra was personally involved in the peace negotiations with Jordan in 1996 and helped develop solutions to the Arava's water deficiencies. Ezra is currently living in Atlanta with his wife Debbie serving as the JNF-KKL Israel Emissary to the Southeast.
