RABBI GLICKMAN'S REAPPOINTMENT CONGREGANT FEEDBACK WANTED

Our current agreement with Rabbi Glickman extends to June, 2018. Because the process of renewing TBH's contract with the Rabbi is complex and multi-faceted, the board is beginning the process now.

The very first step involves asking all members of the congregation for feedback. This is a critically important first step. We want to know your feelings about re-appointment, and we would also like to know what concerns you would like shared with him at this time. Are there changes you would like to see?

Please send your confidential responses to me at: <u>m.abrahamson@cox.net</u>. I will remove all personally identifying information from your e-mail responses prior to sharing them with a Review Committee that will soon be formed. Please send your replies to me by **JANUARY** 15th.

All the details of the review are not yet in place, but I can give you an overall picture of what will follow. After deliberation and discussion, the Review Committee will convey recommendations to the full TBH board. Then there will be a meeting at which time the entire congregation will meet to discuss and vote on the recommendation of the TBH Board.

TORAH PORTIONS

Miketz —Genesis 41:1-44:17 — The portion begins with Pharaoh's portentous dreams, Joseph's interpretations and his subsequent rise to power over Egypt. When a famine strikes the land of Canaan, his brothers come to Egypt seeking grain, but they do not recognize Joseph, who engineers a means by which he can test their character.

Vayigash —**Genesis** 44:18-47:27— The portion begins with the dramatic unveiling of Joseph's true identity and his reconciliation with his brothers. It then proceeds to tell the story of the migration of Jacob's family to Egypt and the rest of the famine years. This Torah portion begins to set the stage for the Egyptian captivity of the sons of Jacob.

Vayechi — **Genesis 47:28-50:26** — In this Torah portion, Jacob prepares for his death by securing a double portion of inheritance for Joseph and then blessing each of his sons with prophetic blessings. The book of Genesis ends with the death of Jacob, followed shortly by the death of Joseph and a promise of redemption from Egypt.

Shemot — **Exodus 1:1-6:1** —As we study the first week's reading from the book of Exodus, we find the children of Israel in slavery. It seems at first that the God of their forefathers has forgotten them. But God has not forgotten His promises. He remembers His promises to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and brings a Redeemer to their children's children, for the sake of His name, with love.


Va'era — Exodus 6:2-9:35 — The portion begins with four expressions of redemption whereby God promises to bring Israel out of the Egyptian bondage. The narrative progresses to tell the story of the first seven of the ten plagues that God unleashed on Egypt.





Shema

The act of listening seems to have become especially difficult this year. From all over the globe we are hearing of the sufferings, ordeals and afflictions of people facing desperate situations. We have been inundated with news reports on scandals, defamation and distractions. Our "threads" constantly ping or tweet alerting us to yet another opinion, another photo, video, snap, message, "insta" condensed into 140 characters. So much said which says almost nothing. Have we lost the ability to really listen? Is there a difference between hearing and listening? Shema. We are called to listen.

Shema.

We are called to hear.

It can feel that life is too busy calling out to us, pulling us along, that we have no capacity to listen, to hear, to give our attention to something other than the urgent task at hand. And yet conceivably there is no task more critical than that of listening in our actions as Jews. How can we know what we are called to do without hearing, without listening? The poor, the widowed, the orphans, the strangers are the focus of our social action and the Jewish call to justice. What do you do when you listen? Most people do not listen with the resolve to understand, but rather with the intent to respond. Our minds fill with our own words, our experience. Listening allows us to clear our self from the mind and allow the other to enter. Through this process listening becomes an active interpretation of what we hear. Listening becomes a process of interpreting what we encounter in the world that goes beyond simply hearing, and becomes action. We have an outstanding opportunity to move outside our community to listen and hear through our annual Shema Tour.

Our Rabbi has arranged an outstanding day for us to begin 2017 in action of our Jewish values. The bus leaves TBH at 9am on Monday January 16. We will return approximately 3pm. The tour this year includes the Chrysalis Center in Hartford. A chrysalis is a cocoon and represents the transformation people undergo as they work to change their lives. The Chrysalis Center is taking a new and innovative approach to helping those in need. We are very fortunate to have this opportunity to learn from them.

We will then get back on our luxury bus and head into West Hartford to visit the Solomon Schechter Day School. Perhaps we will learn more about the new position held by Cantor Harris. We'll have our lunch at the school before a stop at the Judaica store that not only has an impressive collection of gifts, but a great selection of Jewish books, both fiction and non-fiction. Our last stop is the newly refurbished Crown Market. Come hear the story of how we almost lost this venerable institution after 76 years in business. 
