Chrysalis Center, Inc. Becomes Our Tzedakah Focus for 5777

An exciting meeting was held on January 24th to discuss Temple Beth Hillel's charitable focus for 2017. In an unusual turn of events one organization was chosen, but two events will be promoted! The first event is Donation Creation, a food drive with a twist. Donation Creation is a can drive and community art project competition where organizations collect cans, create a work of art using the cans, and take a picture of the artwork to send to Chrysalis Center. Then, of course, the canned goods are donated to the Centers Fresh Place food pantry. This aspect of the Chrysalis Center's work is comprehensive in its approach. Only 100 people or families are assisted by Fresh Place at a time. Participants commit to learning about healthy food, managing food and are linked to other community organizations that will help them with a hand up, rather than a hand out. Fresh Place offers its clients the opportunity to choose their own foods, including fresh meats and produce.

The second event we are promoting is the Centers Empty Bowls project. Congregants Judy Scott will be heading up this promotion, and Sharon Greenfield is taking charge of Donation Creation. Together, the effort is the 20/20/20 campaign.

Here's how you can help: 20/20/20 Campaign

We are asking each Temple member to support Donation Creation by donating 20 cans, \$20, or 20 minutes to support our creation.

Cans – this is how we will build our creation

Money – volunteers will go purchase additional cans.

Time – we need people with all sorts of talents to help throughout this process

- Artistic Ability - flyers, Artwork for what we could build
- Writing - letters to supermarkets asking for donations, articles in temple newsletter and/or local newspapers explaining what we're doing.
- Driving - bringing letters to supermarkets, cans back to temple, cans to Chrysalis center in April
- Building – turn our pile of cans into an artistic, engineering, and architectural marvel.

A box for donations will be setup in the lobby the weekend of March 3.

TORAH PORTIONS

Terumah — Exodus 25:1-27:19 — In Exodus 25:2, the LORD commanded Moses to “tell the sons of Israel to [take] a contribution for Me.” The word translated as “contribution” is *terumah* (תרומה), which is the name of this Torah portion. *Terumah* is a word with no real English equivalent. In the Torah, *terumah* refers to a certain type of offering dedicated to the Temple, like a tithe or firstfruits offering. In Exodus 25, the contribution is for the building of a holy place. This Torah reading is occupied with the instructions for the building of the Tabernacle and its furnishings.

Tetzaveh — Exodus 27:20-30:10 — This Torah portion continues to narrate the instructions for the construction of the Tabernacle, focusing particularly on the priesthood that was to serve in that sanctuary. The Israelites are commanded to make special garments for Aaron and his sons to wear while ministering as priests. After describing the priestly garments, the portion concludes with instructions for the ritual inauguration of Aaron and his sons into the priesthood.

Ki Tisa — Exodus 30:11-34:35 — The portion begins with instructions for taking a census, finishes up the instructions for making the Tabernacle, reiterates the commandment of Shabbat and then proceeds to tell the story of the golden calf. The majority of *Ki Tisa* is concerned with the sin of the golden calf, the breach in the covenant between God and Israel, and how Moses undertakes to restore that covenant relationship.

Vayak'hel — Exodus 35:1-40:38 — This portion from the Torah describes how the assembly of Israel worked together to build the Tabernacle. In most years, synagogues read *Vayakhel* together with the *Pekudei*

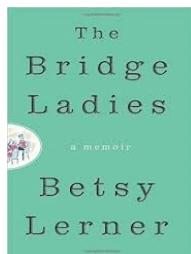

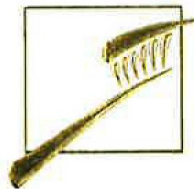
