TORAH PORTIONS

Ki-Tisa—Exodus 30:11-34:35— The portion begins with instructions for taking a census, finishes up the instructions for making the Tabernacle, reiterates the commandment of Shabbat and then proceeds to tell the story of the golden calf. The majority of Ki Tisa is concerned with the sin of the golden calf, the breach in the covenant between God and Israel, and how Moses undertakes to restore that covenant relationship.

Vayak'heil— Exodus 35:1-38:20— . This portion from the Torah describes how the assembly of Israel worked together to build the Tabernacle

Vayikra— Leviticus 1:1-5:26 — This portion introduces the sacrificial service and describes five different types of sacrifices.

Tzav— Leviticus 6:1-8:36 — The last chapter of the reading describes the seven-day ordination of Aaron and his sons as they prepared to enter the holy priesthood.

Pesach-We read that a “mixed multitude” of people fled Egypt with the Israelites. With no time to wait, they took the cakes from their oven before they had time to rise. By God’s mighty hand, our ancestors fled the house of bondage and were brought to “a land flowing with milk and honey.” As a reminder of God’s redemption, we are instructed to eat only unleavened bread during Passover. Furthermore, the text tells us to explain to our children, “It is because of what God did for me when I went free from Egypt.” The Hebrew word for explain, v’higgadta, has the same root as Haggadah, the book from which we read on Passover. In doing so, each year we fulfill the sacred obligation to tell this story to our children. It is this story, more than any other that is central to Judaism. God redeemed us from slavery and we therefore know the heart of the stranger.

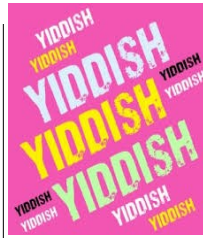

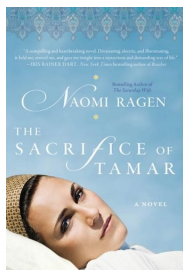

The next book club will be March 13, 7:00. The book this month is The Sacrifice of Tamar, by Naomi Ragen,

A violent crime transforms the predictable life of a young Rabbi's wife, leading to terrible sacrifices. Tamar Fine gold is a happy young bride in one of Brooklyn's insulated ultra-Orthodox enclaves. But this staid, predictable life is violently altered when Tamar is raped by an intruder as she baby-sits for her nephew. Humiliated and confused, she refuses to risk the unbearable stigma of discovery, but in her attempt to hide her shame, she is sent plummeting into a

moral crisis: when she discovers she is pregnant and cannot be sure who the father is. In the end, heartbreaking sacrifices and impossible decisions lead to a surprising triumph of the human spirit.

Hurricane Maria Relief

Hurricane Maria devastated the American island of Puerto Rico late last September. Residents are still struggling to regain normalcy in their lives. It's estimated that some 40,000 citizens have already relocated to Connecticut. Close to 2,000 people, 600 families, relocated to Hartford. The Greater Hartford Jewish community was quick to react to their needs, joining forces with the CREC Hurricane Relief Center. Under the umbrella of the Federation, local synagogues, Jewish schools and agencies came together to provide clothing, toiletry items and food staples, as well as expressions of welcome, kindness and support.

Beginning in October clothing donations began, which started with a clearing of the racks at Tara's Closet, part of Jewish Family Services. From there donations flooded in. Thousands of articles of clothing needed to be sorted and organized for distribution. Approximately 95 people from various groups spent several Sundays tackling this task. Of those 95 people, just over one-third were Temple Beth Hillel members, many of whom volunteered all four sorting days.

Food collection, which ran from late December through the beginning of February is estimated at filling 7 SUV's. I made 6 trips to the center with both my car trunk and backseat full. According to the Toyota website a Corolla trunk has a 13 cubic feet capacity – any way you measure IT'S A LOT OF FOOD! Thank you so much to all who contributed!

In November, toiletries were collected. Overall, 2 SUV's were packed to the brim! From that my Toyota Corolla trunk, backseat and even a few items on the front passenger seat were added. Arriving at the Federation with our contribution, Alana Butler, Director of Community Engagement, was astounded. "What group are you from again?" she asked. "Temple Beth Hillel - We're the small congregation with the big heart" was my reply.

The Brit Olam Society, a sub-group of the Social Action Squad at TBH is proud to announce our signing of the Brit Olam, the covenant with our world. The Brit Olam, which was introduced by the [Religious Action Center](#), reminds us the Reform Jewish Movement is dedicated to taking powerful action together to bring change upon the world we want – a world filled with justice, compassion and wholeness*.

The Brit Olam Society studied several areas of concern, such as refugee issues, and environmental concerns, choosing Economic Injustice as the focus for our combined efforts. The Society hopes to bring attention to the root causes of poverty through educational programs, as well as build partnerships with local agencies to bolster efforts to combat hunger and the reading gap in our local community.

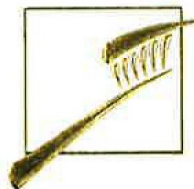
