FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

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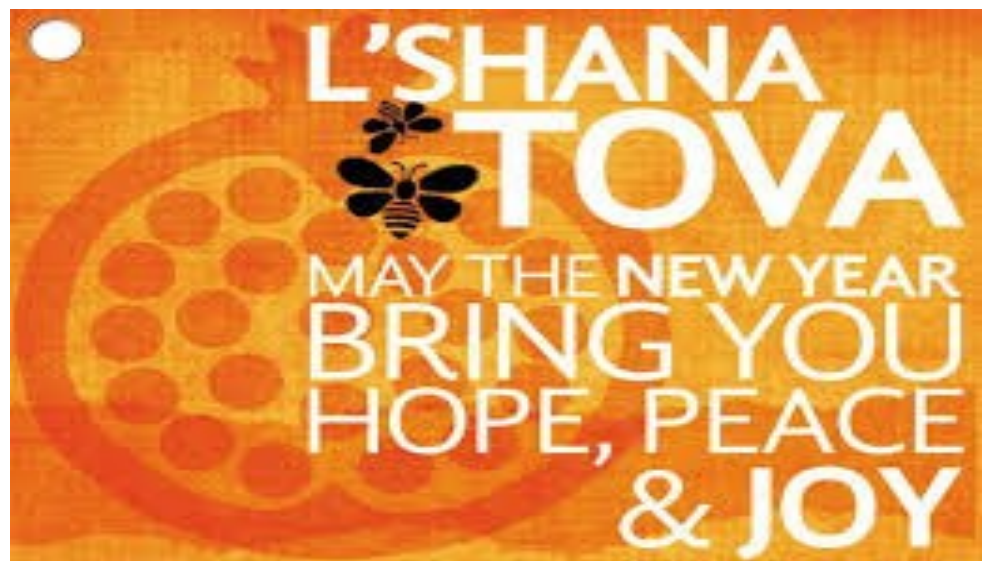
Decades back, a United States president gave a speech which included this:
A couple of days ago when I was in Florida a Jewish friend of mine gave me this liturgy book called "Gates of Repentance." And there was this incredible passage from the Yom Kippur liturgy. I would like to read it to you:

"Now is the time for turning. The leaves are beginning to turn from green to red to orange. The birds are beginning to turn and are heading once more toward the south. The animals are beginning to turn to storing their food for the winter. For leaves, birds and animals, turning comes instinctively. But for us, turning does not come so easily. It takes an act of will for us to make a turn. It means breaking old habits. It means admitting that we have been wrong, and this is never easy. It means losing face. It means starting all over again. And this is always painful. It means saying I am sorry. It means recognizing that we have the ability to change. These things are terribly hard to do. But unless we turn, we will be trapped forever in yesterday's ways. Lord help us to turn, from callousness to sensitivity, from hostility to love, from pettiness to purpose, from envy to contentment, from carelessness to discipline, from fear to faith. Turn us around, O Lord, and bring us back toward you. Revive our lives as at the beginning, and turn us toward each other, Lord, for in isolation there is no life."

Jewish values have always shaped our great country. As these High Holy Days settle upon us, let these same values shape us.

TORAH PORTIONS

KiTavo— Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8 - This Torah portion begins with laws regarding first fruits and tithes. It goes on to discuss covenant renewal, after which Moses recites the blessings guaranteed to Israel for covenant obedience and warns of the curses for apostasy.

Nitzavim—Deuteronomy 29:9-30: 0 - In this portion, Moses invites the entire assembly of Israel to take on the covenant. He warns them that if they sin, they will go into exile, but he also predicts that, in the future, they will repent and God will return them to the land of Israel. In some years, Nitzavim is read together with the subsequent Torah portion, Vayelech, on the same Sabbath.

Vayelech— Deuteronomy 31:1-31:30 In this short portion, Moses commands an assembly for a public Torah reading and covenant renewal once every seven years. He then finishes writing the scroll of the Torah and has it deposited in the Holy of Holies next to the ark of the covenant.

Ha'azinu— Deuteronomy 32:1-32:52 — This Torah portion is only a single chapter long, and the majority of it consists of the Song of Moses. The Song of Moses is a prophetic oracle warning Israel about apostasy to come and the resulting wrath of God. The song looks far into the future, even envisioning the Messianic advent amid rich and frightening apocalyptic imagery. After the conclusion of the song, Moses is told to ascend Mount Nebo and overlook the Promised Land before dying.

the world.

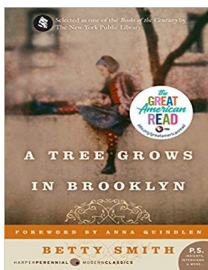

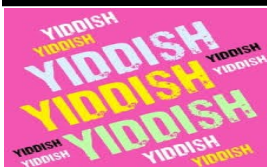

**MERGER COMPLETE BETWEEN TEMPLE BETH HILLEL IN SOUTH WINDSOR
& CONGREGATION BETH AHM OF WINDSOR**
High Holy Days Tickets are Available Now

SOUTH WINDSOR/WINDSOR, CONN., August 22, 2018 – The merger between Temple Beth Hillel in South Windsor and Congregation Beth Ahm in Windsor is complete, uniting two longtime Connecticut Jewish houses of worship. Jason Wasserman, President of Temple Beth Hillel, and Marcia Heneson, a member of Congregation Beth Ahm's Executive Committee, signed and filed the legal documents earlier this week.

The expected union was announced this past Spring. On June 24, in a symbolic act of blending, members of both congregations participated in a Torah Tiyul (Walk) from the Windsor synagogue at 362 Palisado Avenue to Temple Beth Hillel at 20 Baker Lane in South Windsor. They carried one of Congregation Beth Ahm's sacred Torah scrolls along the 10-mile route and placed it into the ark of its new home. Days later, Congregation Beth Ahm closed its doors at the building it built in 1960, after 68 years of serving the community.

Over the summer, many ritual items and artwork from Congregation Beth Ahm were carefully packed, transported and installed in their new home at Temple Beth Hillel. They included the Windsor synagogue's ark that housed its torahs, and now it becomes the focus of an additional sanctuary in the South Windsor temple, thanks in part to funding from the Jewish Community Foundation of West Hartford.

"During the past few months, members of both congregations have joined in numerous social and religious events, and we already are working together like longtime family," explains Rabbi Jeffrey Glickman, Temple Beth Hillel's religious leader since 1996. "We look forward to spending the High Holy Days as one, and we welcome all interested Greater Hartford residents to join us."

The public should contact Temple Beth Hillel in advance to request tickets for the upcoming High Holy Days. Much of the temple's High Holy Days services are in English and members of the congregation and the community participate in readings. This year, Rosh Hashana begins at sunset on Sunday evening, September 9 and continues through Yom Kippur, which ends at sunset on Wednesday, September 19.

Temple Beth Hillel was formed in 1960 in South Windsor, and in 2000, moved into its current building on the corner of Governors Highway and Baker Lane in the same town, carrying a Torah from the old building to the new. Affiliated with the Union of Reform Judaism, the synagogue holds services in English and Hebrew, has an active religious school, and is very involved in social action and social justice.

Congregation Beth Ahm was founded in 1951 by 16 Jewish families and was then known as The Jewish Community of Greater Windsor. Initially, the group held services and started a religious school at a local church, waiting for the Synagogue's own facility to be constructed. In September 1960, Congregation Beth Ahm finally opened the doors at a newly built building at 362 Palisado Avenue in the heart of the Windsor Historic District. In late June 2018, it closed its doors and sold the building, and now has merged with Temple Beth Hillel of South Windsor.
