The Slowest Eater

Micah was a slow eater. It's not that he was fussy – he just took his time. Maybe it was because he liked to savor his food. Maybe it was because he liked sitting at the table with all of his big brothers and sisters and his parents. He could

see them eye to eye and liked being a part of things. He wasn't always the first to show up for a meal, but he was always the last to finish.

Sometimes, everyone else was in a rush, but Micah just sat there, eating a little bit of the lasagna and then stopping; a few peas and then looking up and thinking; a sip of water and few words about what was on his mind.

His father would say, "Micah, it is good to be a slow eater." When his father was in a hurry, he would try to hold back his nerves and say, "Mi-cah. It is good. To be. A slow. Eater."

"Why don't you tell Micah to finish up?" the teens would ask.

"Well, sometimes it is good to move quickly and really get things done. But eating is different. It is one way God shows us love. All the things we eat come from God and they are the way that we get new energy to live. If we always appreciate our food, then we can better appreciate other gifts we are given. Besides, it's healthier to chew your food well."

As Micah grew up, he was never lazy, but he did like to linger on things. He would notice stuff that others couldn't, like what people were wearing, why they kept using a certain word, why something didn't make sense.

He wondered why people spend so much time looking forward to going to the beach, but when they get there, they soon want to do something else.

One day, a dangerous illness spread throughout the world. We were told to stay inside and not be close to other people. Micah was not able to go to the library or even the park.

People were wishing this would hurry up and end.

TORAH PORTIONS

ACHAREI MOT/KEDOSHIM —Leviticus 16:1-20:27 Leviticus 16 describes the Tabernacle ceremony for the holy festival of the Day of Atonement. Leviticus 17 establishes general rules for sacrifice and sanctuary. Leviticus 18 lays down specific laws about permitted and forbidden sexual relationships. Leviticus 19 describes the holy community through a series of specific commandments. Leviticus 20 warns against the snares of sexual immorality and idolatry, mandating a death penalty for certain sins. Except in biblical leap years, Kedoshim is read on the same Sabbath as the previous reading, Acharei Mot.

EMOR— Leviticus 21:1-24:23 Emor begins with special laws of sanctity, propriety and purity for the priesthood. Leviticus 23 provides an overview of the biblical calendar, a listing of the LORD's appointed times.

BEHAR/BECHUKOTAI — Leviticus 25:1-27:34 This portion from the Torah introduces the laws of the sabbatical years, the jubilee and laws concerning redemption. This last reading from Leviticus promises blessings and rewards for Israel if they will keep the Torah, but punishment and curses if they break the commandments of the Torah. The last chapter discusses laws pertaining to vows, valuations and tithes

BAMIDBAR — Numbers 1:1-4:20 The first reading from Bamidbar and the thirty-fourth reading from the Torah begin with a census of the tribes of Israel and the Levitical families just prior to the departure from Sinai.

SHENI SHEL SHAVU'OT —Deuteronomy 14:22-16:17 The reading for this day includes the Ten Commandments, re-enacting this climactic moment in Jewish history and establishing the covenantal relationship between God and the Jewish people. It is traditional for the Book of Ruth to be read on Shavuot. The story of Ruth takes place during the harvest, which reminds us that Shavuot is also a Festival, when our ancestors brought the first fruits of the harvest to the Temple. Ruth, by converting to Judaism, reminds us that each of us makes the choice to accept Torah into our lives. The reading of Ruth has served to elevate the status of converts (Jews-by-Choice) in Reform Judaism.

Our Shema Tour Collection Efforts Continue during COVID-19

During the past month, Temple Beth Hillel's partnership and support for the Walk in the Light Church of God in North Hartford has actually strengthened, despite the current isolating situation. During the month of April, several TBH members delivered toiletries, sox, formula, diapers, disinfectants, and \$10 gas station gift cards that were dropped in my garage and then transferred to the church.

Last week, the church's Archbishop Dexter Burke reported that his focus now is providing food to hungry people in his neighborhood, many of whom have lost their jobs. Since our current situation makes it difficult for TBH members to donate and deliver food, we have been using funds generously donated by our members to purchase a variety of essential items, some of which can be ordered on line and shipped directly. We will continue to work closely with the Archbishop on these special needs as we move through this difficult time.
