



HILLEL HAPPENINGS

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



Before serving Temple Beth Hillel, I was the rabbi of Temple Adath Joseph in St. Joseph, Missouri for six years.

One Shabbat, we were invited to dinner at the big congregation in Kansas City, about an hour south of us. It was nice being part of a big caravan driving down. Dinner was lovely; our hosts were so welcoming.

After dinner, we went into their sanctuary for services. Shortly after we started, there was a tornado warning, and we all went into the basement. It was a little cramped, but we all fit. After a couple of minutes, I recommended that we continue the service -- without prayerbooks.

People sang along, not realizing they knew so many prayers by heart. Then the lights went out. There was one, small, emergency light. You could barely recognize the person next to you. Still, we kept singing. The prayers felt so genuine. We became lost in the moment; lost in the melody; lost in the magic.

The lights were only off for 20 minutes, but they were a very moving 20 minutes. At the end, several people told me that we should have services in the dark every year. They really meant it.

Being a part of "social distancing" worship is not anything any of us would have chosen. None of us in Missouri chose to have a tornado warning. However, the unusual circumstance gave rise to a new spiritual insight. I suspect there are many insights we will glean from these "quarantimes." Maybe it has to do with filling our homes with Jewish songs. Maybe it has to do with praying with people who live far away.

If there is something from these times you feel we should do every year, let us know.

Dear Temple Beth Hillel Family,

During these unprecedented times of global crisis, we, at TBH, have a hero!

Our congregation is blessed to have an anonymous generous benefactor who truly believes in and acts upon the words from the Talmud that state: “All Jews are responsible for each other.”

We have been offered a 2-to-1 matching grant, up to \$50,000. That means if we raise \$50,000 in donations to our General Fund, the donor will add an additional \$100,000. Our General Fund is used to pay essential expenses including: our building’s mortgage, utilities, and insurance; clergy and staff salaries; security services (greatly increased over the past year); snow removal and landscaping; and membership in the URJ. Achieving this fundraising goal will allow TBH to **significantly reduce or eliminate our budget deficit.**

Since this is a match, we are required to do our own fundraising. **Here are the rules:**

1. **Donations must be made to the General Fund.** Donations to other funds will NOT count towards the match.
2. **Any amount** donated counts towards the \$50,000 base figure and will be matched. Donations **must be made between now and December 31st, 2020.**
3. **Credit cards: Donate securely via PayPal by [clicking here](#), or by scanning the QR code below** with your smartphone camera, **or by calling Lori**, our administrative assistant, at the Temple office at **860-282-8466.**
4. **Checks: Mail to the Temple** or drop in the LOCKED mailbox outside the Temple office or at the end of our driveway.
5. **Cash: Donations can be dropped off** at the Temple office or dropped in the LOCKED mailboxes outside the Temple office or at the end of our driveway.

TORAH PORTIONS

SUKKOT — Leviticus 22:26-23:44 Sukkot (Hebrew: סוכות, sukkōt, or sukkos, Feast of Booths, Feast of Tabernacles) is a Biblical holiday celebrated on the 15th day of the month of Tishrei (late September to late October). It is one of the three biblically mandated festivals, shalosh regalim, on which Jews were commanded to make a pilgrimage to the Temple in Jerusalem. According to the prophet Zechariah, in the messianic era, Sukkot will become a universal festival and all nations will make pilgrimages annually to Jerusalem to celebrate the feast there.

SHEMINI ATZERET — Deuteronomy 14:22-16:17 This is the blessing with which Moses, the man of God, bade the Israelites farewell before he died.

B'REISHEET—Genesis 1:1-6:8 Genesis describes the origins of everything. It begins with the origins of the universe, focuses on the origins of man and then explores the origins of the nation of Israel.

As we study the first week's reading from the book of Genesis, we will learn a great deal about God, but even more about ourselves. After all, this is the story of our origins. When properly understood, the story of our origin helps us find our destination.

NOACH— Genesis 6:9-11:32 The second reading in the book of Genesis is named after Noah. In Hebrew, the name Noah is spelled Noach (נח). The word Noach is related to the Hebrew word for "rest." Genesis 5:29 says that his parents named him Noah (Noach) because they hoped their son would give them rest (nacham, נחם) from their toil. The contents of section Noah tell the story of Noah's flood, the tower of Babel and the beginning of the Abrahamic line.

LECH LECHA—Genesis 12:1-17:27 The third reading from the book of Genesis is named Lech Lecha (לך לך). It means "go forth." The first verse says, "Now the LORD said to Abram, 'Go forth (lech lecha) from your country.'" Section Lech Lecha introduces Abraham and tells the story of his pilgrimage in pursuit of God.
