A person should always be soft like a reed, and he should not be stiff like a cedar. An incident occurred in which Rabbi Elazar, son of Rabbi Shimon, came from Migdal Gedor, from his rabbi's house, and he was riding on a donkey and strolling on the bank of the river. And he was very happy, and his head was swollen with pride because he had studied much Torah.

He happened upon an exceedingly ugly person, who said to him: "Greetings to you, my rabbi," but Rabbi Elazar did not return his greeting. Instead, Rabbi Elazar said to him: "Worthless [reika] person, how ugly is that man. Are all the people of your city as ugly as you?" The man said to him: "I do not know, but you should go and say to the Craftsman Who made me: How ugly is the vessel you made." When Rabbi Elazar realized that he had sinned and insulted this man merely on account of his appearance, he descended from his donkey and prostrated himself before him, and he said to the man: "I have sinned against you; forgive me." The man said to him: "I will not forgive you until you go to the Craftsman Who made me and say: How ugly is the vessel you made."

He walked behind the man, trying to appease him, until they reached Rabbi Elazar's city. The people of his city came out to greet him, saying to him: "Greetings to you, my rabbi, my rabbi, my master, my master." The man said to them: "Who are you calling my rabbi, my rabbi?" They said to him: "To this man, who is walking behind you." He said to them: "If this man is a rabbi, may there not be many like him among the Jewish people." They asked him: "For what reason do you say this?" He said to them: He did such and such to me. They said to him: "Even so, forgive him, as he is a great Torah scholar."

He said to them: "For your sakes I forgive him, provided that he accepts upon himself not to become accustomed to behave like this." Immediately, Rabbi Elazar, son of Rabbi Shimon, entered the study hall and taught: "A person should always be soft like a reed and he should not be stiff like a cedar, as one who is proud like a cedar is likely to sin. And therefore, due to its gentle qualities, the reed merited that a quill is taken from it to write with it a Torah scroll, phylacteries, and mezuzot."

Shabbat Services Update – All Services Online Only for Now

The Coronavirus Task Force has been meeting frequently and working closely with our clergy, the Religious Practices Committee, the Safety Committee and the Board in an effort to resume in-person worship.

We have been regularly reviewing CDC guidelines, State of Connecticut directives and local practices. We have developed our own protocols, including sanitizing and social distancing. We have reorganized the space in the sanctuary to allow for greater distances between worshippers and have limited the number of members in attendance. In short, we have taken every action possible to allow for our members who wish to return to in-person worship to be safe and to feel safe in our building. However, in light of the recent release of the most current infection rates in our area, with **“an abundance of caution” we have determined that we must wait to resume in-person worship**.

We **will** continue to offer **virtual Shabbat** worship via Zoom and Livestream. The Task Force will continue to monitor infection rates in our area and remain current with state guidelines, so that we can regularly reassess the possibility of reopening our doors for worship services. We look forward to that time and we remain committed to our mission.

Temple Beth Hillel Responds to Emergency Needs!

When October fires ravaged several apartment buildings across Hartford, Archbishop Dexter Burke and his Walk in the Life Church of God stepped in to help, seeking food and arranging for shelter for dozens of city residents. **Our 2020 Shema Tour partner organization** reached out to us for assistance...and our extraordinary congregation quickly mobilized.

TBH members immediately went to their kitchen pantries, to local supermarkets, and to their own closets for items to donate. Many have been driving items to Laura Soll-Broxterman's garage in Windsor, while others have volunteered to pick up items from fellow TBH members who live near them. Rabbi Glickman and Mindy drove to a large food outlet in Greater Springfield to secure even more food. Numerous donations of cash, checks and gift cards from members and their friends have been used to purchase food, all types of clothing and other essential items, including gas cards so the fire victims still can get to work, regardless of where they temporarily live.

Thanks to the immense kindness of our congregation, **seven SUV loads of supplies were delivered to the church in the first week alone**, and our collections and deliveries continue....**But as we move into cold Fall and Winter months, the need for food and warm clothing is growing** for the North Hartford community served by The Walk in the Light Church of God. Temple Beth Hillel continues to collect items that are immediately distributed to church congregants and their neighbors.

We always seek: nonperishable food items; travel-size toiletries; cases of water; warm clothing of all types (gently used or new) and heavy socks and blankets; personal hygiene products such as travel-size toothbrushes/toothpaste/shampoos; pre-mixed baby formula and disposable diapers, and \$10 gas station gift cards. If you donate funds or gas cards, we purchase specific additional items as needed.

Dear Temple Beth Hillel Family,

During these unprecedented times of global crisis, we, at TBH, have a hero!

Our congregation is blessed to have an anonymous generous benefactor who truly believes in and acts upon the words from the Talmud that state: “All Jews are responsible for each other.”

We have been offered a 2-to-1 matching grant, up to \$50,000. That means if we raise \$50,000 in donations to our General Fund, the donor will add an additional \$100,000. Our General Fund is used to pay essential expenses including: our building’s mortgage, utilities, and insurance; clergy and staff salaries; security services (greatly increased over the past year); snow removal and landscaping; and membership in the URJ. Achieving this fundraising goal will allow TBH to **significantly reduce or eliminate our budget deficit.**

Since this is a match, we are required to do our own fundraising. **Here are the rules:**

1. **Donations must be made to the General Fund.** Donations to other funds will NOT count towards the match.
2. **Any amount** donated counts towards the \$50,000 base figure and will be matched. Donations **must be made between now and December 31st, 2020.**
3. **Credit cards: Donate securely via PayPal by [clicking here](#), or by scanning the QR code below** with your smartphone camera, **or by calling Lori**, our administrative assistant, at the Temple office at **860-282-8466.**
4. **Checks: Mail to the Temple** or drop in the LOCKED mailbox outside the Temple office or at the end of our driveway.
5. **Cash: Donations can be dropped off** at the Temple office or dropped in the LOCKED mailboxes outside the Temple office or at the end of our driveway.

TORAH PORTIONS

VAYERA—Genesis 18:1-22:24 The fourth reading from the book of Genesis is named *Vayera* (.וירא) means "And he appeared" because the first story describes how the LORD appeared to Abraham one day as he sat outside his tent. Section *Vayera* continues with the series of tests of faith for Abraham, concluding in one great and final trial.

CHAYEI SARAH— Genesis 23:1-25:18 This portion of the Torah is filled with romance and sorrow. It tells the story of how Abraham mourned his wife after her passing, and how he procured a wife for his son Isaac. At the end of this portion, Abraham is laid to rest beside his beloved wife.

TOLDOT— Genesis 25:19-28:9 *Toldot* tells us the story of the birth of Jacob and Esau and their struggle for the birthright and blessing of their father, Isaac. We also learn about Isaac's trials and difficulties in the land of Canaan. The portion concludes with Jacob's deception of Isaac in order to procure the family blessing.

VAYETZE—Genesis 28:10-32:2 This portion tells the story of Jacob's flight from his brother Esau, his vision at Bethel, his employment with his uncle Laban and his marriage to the two sisters, Rachel and Leah. Jacob's double marriage results in a baby-bearing contest that gives him eleven sons. At the end of the portion, Jacob leaves Laban and returns to the land of Canaan, but not before Laban tries to stop him.

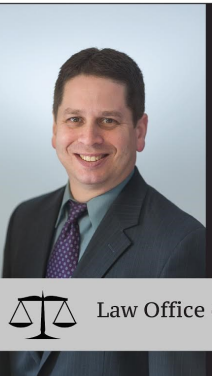
