FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Acts Of God



Normally, when we hear the phrase, "acts of God," it is followed by the word "excluded."

That is because it is usually found in an insurance policy. "Acts of God excluded."

What they are referring to are unforeseen catastrophes on such a pervasive scale that the insurance company would go under if they had to pay everyone. Floods and plagues, earthquakes and asteroids, wiping out whole areas of a country -- now these are acts of God. A dictionary might define "act of God" as "Noun. Unforeseen disaster causing widespread tragedy."

This week, the gale force winds and driving rain wreaked havoc on our town. The rains soaked the soil so roots couldn't grip the ground as firmly. Trees fell all over. One of them was our beloved linden tree.

Twenty years ago, when we moved in, we planted that tree. It was situated as the first thing you would see when you entered our neighborhood, so we got a nice, three year old sapling. It looked like a tall stick. I knew it was the right tree, because our childhood home was 715 North Linden Drive.

What a glorious tree! It quickly grew to 40 feet, with a trunk 50 inches around. From far away, it was an incredible specimen; lush, broad and symmetrical. From up close, it was much more amazing.

The beautiful young leaves could be eaten like spinach, or to add depth to the flavor of a broth. But the real treasures were the flowers. They are so small, it takes motivation to fully harvest the giant tree. They are dried to make tilia, a highly desired and expensive tea with a wonderful aroma and subtle, rich flavor.

As if that wasn't enough, the linden tree contains a magical secret which takes patience to appreciate. The flowers give off a heavenly perfume which fills the neighborhood for three weeks, but only from trees which are at least 20 years old.

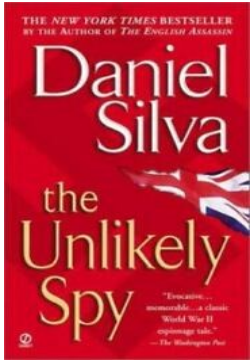

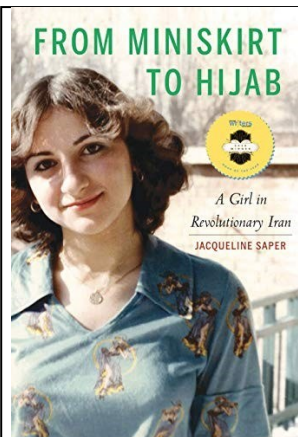

Seth Healy's Social Action Initiative



This month, we shine a light on the generosity of Seth Healy, a recent TBH Bar Mitzvah. It was evident to many of us how interested Seth was in Social Action back in January 2020 when he attended and participated in our annual Shema Tour experience. That day, a busload of members visited three nonprofits, including The Simon Foundation in Bloomfield (Walk in the Light Church of God that we selected as our Shema Partner).

Seth was impressed by what he saw and heard at the Simon Foundation, an organization dedicated to the preservation and adoption of dogs and cats. In fact, it was one of three charities to which he donated funds from his Bar Mitzvah gifts. Seth and his family recently revisited the organization and he presented Jane Zuckerman, the Feline Adoption Coordinator, with a check for \$200. She told him it will be used toward medical expenses for the cats and dogs before they are adopted, and she even let the family play with kittens that were up for adoption.

"I chose to donate money to the Simon Foundation because lots of people treat animals unfairly, and I wanted to donate to a shelter that helps animals," explained Seth. "So I chose the Simon Foundation because we had visited them on the Shema Tour, and we knew that they were a good organization to donate to. We had lots of fun playing with the kittens while we were there. It felt good to donate to a good cause."

Thank you, Seth, for the Mitzvah you performed and the kindness you've exhibited with your fellow classmates, teachers, and other members of our congregation every day.

Summer Update on Shema Partner Support

In late June, Karen Groenstein and Laura Soll-Broxterman met with Archbishop Burke of The Walk in the Light Church of God at the Church to review the final major projects needed to make the church a safe and welcoming place for his members and the North End surrounding community. This included emergency flood clean-up and repairs to the basement due to this season's numerous rainstorms. Together, we developed a list of immediate and secondary projects which included installation of the new shower and bathroom equipment that TBH donated earlier in the summer. We carefully priced items needed and then presented him with \$2,000 from the Social Action Fund (member donations over the past year) in material items and dollars.

TBH's major collection focus for August, September and October is for nonperishable food items, personal hygiene products, and cleaning supplies such as bleach and paper towels.

In November, we will start collecting winter clothing for adults and children.

Of course, monetary donations are always welcome as we can purchase specific needed items – especially during emergency situations.

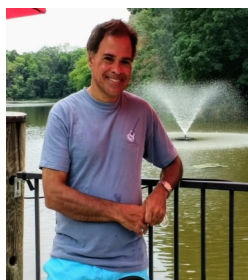

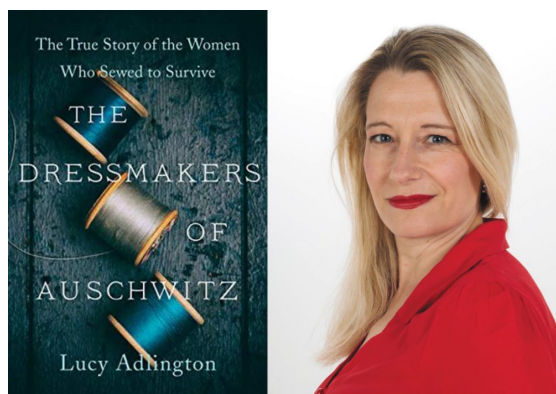

RE'EH— *Deuteronomy 11:26-16:17* You shall not hesitate to give, nor murmur when you do give; because you shall know who is the good repayer of the hire. You shall not turn away from him that is in want, but you shall share all things with your brother, and shall not say that they are your own; for if you are partakers in that which is immortal, how much more in things which are mortal? (Didache 4:7-8)

SHOFTIM —*Deuteronomy 16:18-21:9* The commandment for the king to write a copy of the Torah demonstrates the work of Messiah. He Himself is the Word made flesh. He is the copy of the Torah in human form. Furthermore, He writes a copy of the Torah as He writes the Torah upon our hearts. The Torah of King Messiah is written not with ink, but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone, but on tablets of human hearts (2 Corinthians 3:3).

KI TETZE—*Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19* Rabbi Meir said, There is a parable about this matter. To what can it be compared? It can be compared to two identical twin brothers. Both lived in a certain city. One was appointed king, and the other became a bandit. At the king's command they hanged the bandit. But everyone who saw him hanging there said, The king has been hung! Therefore the king issued a command and he was taken down. (b.Sanhedrin 46b)

KITAVO—*Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8* This Torah portion begins with laws regarding first fruits and tithes. It goes on to discuss covenant renewal, after which Moses recites the blessings guaranteed to Israel for covenant obedience and warns of the curses for apostasy.

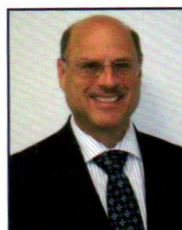
