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FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



Tu Bishvat is around the corner. It is the reminder that summer will actually return. The omen is in the trees which start their sap flowing.

Often on Tu Bishvat (the birthday of the trees), we read about Honi the Circle Maker, and how it is important to plant for future generations. However, we don't often finish the story,

which has a deep meaning about life and companionship.

Shalom, Rabbi G.

Talmud, Taanit 23a:

One day, Honi was walking along the road when he saw a certain man planting a carob tree. Honi said to him: This tree, after how many years will it bear fruit? The man said to him: It will not produce fruit until seventy years have passed. Honi said to him: Is it obvious to you that you will live seventy years, that you expect to benefit from this tree? He said to him: That man himself found a world full of carob trees. Just as my ancestors planted for me, I too am planting for my descendants.

Honi sat and ate bread. Sleep overcame him and he slept. A cliff formed around him, and he disappeared from sight and slept for seventy years. When he awoke, he saw a certain man gathering carobs from that tree. Honi said to him: Are you the one who planted this tree? The man said to him: I am his son's son. Honi said to him: I can learn from this that I have slept for seventy years, and indeed he saw that his donkey had sired several herds during those many years.

Honi went home and said to the members of the household: Is the son of Honi HaMe'aggel alive? They said to him: His son is no longer with us, but his son's son is alive. He said to them: I am Honi HaMe'aggel. They did not believe him. He went to the study hall, where he heard the Sages say about one scholar: His halakhot are as enlightening and as clear as in the years of Honi HaMe'aggel, for when Honi HaMe'aggel would enter the study hall he would resolve for the Sages any difficulty they had. Honi said to them: I am he, but they did not believe him and did not pay him proper respect. Honi became very upset, prayed for mercy, and died. Rava said: This explains the folk saying that people say: Either friendship or death, as one who has no friends is better off dead.

THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER

The news these days can be scary. Every day, it seems like something is being cancelled, someplace is in crises, somebody thinks somebody else is on the wrong path.

As President, I'm also privy to news about other URJ congregations and regional Jewish organizations. As you've often heard me say from the bimah, there's no shortage of opinions or approaches from these groups about how to deal with the constantly-changing COVID-19 situation. Some organizations have shut down their buildings and returned to fully-remote for all events. Others are demanding proof of vaccination in order to participate in-person.

I'm proud to say that we are holding steady with the existing plan from our COVID Task Force. The building remains open for all events and activities except for eating. Masks are required for everyone except the clergy when they are on the bimah. Vaccines are definitely encouraged, but documentation is not necessary. Live streaming will continue, and we are still recruiting volunteers to help run Zoom again for those who prefer it. (Email Jeff Levin <u>ilevin@tbhsw.org</u> to volunteer!)

This allows us to continue to offer all the spirituality, services, education, and community as we've always done, while keeping everyone safe and connected. And as far as we're aware, there has not been a single case of COVID transmission at TBH with this approach. Don't take this for granted – it means lots of people are all doing their parts to follow the rules to help protect our community. To each of you: Thank you!

TBH Key Fob Informational Letter

Temple Beth Hillel is installing a new **Key Fob System** to improve the safety and security of our congregation.

We're offering one fob per family as an <u>optional</u>, <u>zero-cost</u> benefit to our **Members living in Connecticut**. A key fob is small device that sits on your key chain and lets you unlock the doors on your own. Simply **tap the sensor by the door and you're in!**

There is **no risk of setting off the alarm!** Fobs will only unlock the doors *after* someone has disarmed the system. This means you can use your fob during services and events along with other Temple members.

The new system lets us keep our outer doors locked for better security, while our building remains **open and welcoming to all**. And if you choose not to have a fob, no problem! Ushers will be there for you.

If you would like to receive your free and optional fob, please stop by the Temple office during normal business hours (8am-2pm Mon, Tues, Thurs, and Fri) or schedule a time before Shabbat on Friday evening. If you are a Religious School family, we will have them available during school times on Tuesdays and Sundays. Unfortunately, we can't put them in the mail so **please come on down!**

Lastly, if you happen to have a key to the building, please drop it off with Lori at your convenience. We are re-keying the locks so they won't work as of January 2022, but your new fob will replace the old keys. We are here if you have any questions. Please reach out!



SOCIAL ACTION

Update on South Windsor's Efforts to Co-sponsor an Afghan Family

Dozens of TBH members have been working with our neighbors of other faiths in the hopes of helping to resettle an Afghan refugee family in South Windsor. Our initiative, the South Windsor Refugee Alliance (SWRA), is partnering with New Haven-based IRIS CT (Integrated Refugee & Immigrant Services) to "co-sponsor" a family. Rabbi Jeff and Mindy Glickman, local clergy, community leaders, and our TBH Social Action Committee have been involved in this effort that is comprised of a dozen committees focused on locating housing, helping the family find employment, education, healthcare, and much more.

Due to large quantity of refugees to be placed in various Connecticut cities/towns, the resettlement process is taking more time than originally expected. But we are very hopeful that a family will be relocated in South Windsor within the next two months...sometimes, there is less than one week's notice.

So, we welcome and need your input now, even before the family arrives. Please tell us if you know of:

- Rental apartments or houses on a public transportation line. Contact Rabbi Glickman.
- **Employers** who would hire someone who doesn't speak English. **Contact** TBH member Emily Cobbs.
- TBH volunteers who can drive the family to appointments in the first months after they arrive. Contact Laura Soll-Broxterman
- Individuals who speak Dari/Farci or Pashto who could help with occasional interpretation needs until the family is more conversant in English. Contact Laura Soll-Broxterman

Our South Windsor planning also is responsible for raising funds to help with basic needs during the family's first months. This includes rent, food, utilities, transportation needs, and more. You can send a donation now *OR* make a pledge to help once the family arrives.

NOTE: Until we know how many are coming, we will <u>not</u> collect any clothing, furniture, or household items.

TORAH PORTIONS

BO— Exodus 10:1-13:16 — The portion begins by concluding the narrative of the ten plagues, the tenth of which is the slaying of the firstborn. To avoid the plague, the Israelites are given the instructions for the Passover sacrifice and the laws of the Feast of Unleavened Bread. Pharaoh finally consents to let Israel go, and they leave Egypt.

B'SHALACH—Exodus 13:17-17:16—The reading tells the adventures of the Israelites as they leave

Egypt, cross the Red Sea, receive miraculous provision in the wilderness and face their first battle.

YITRO—Exodus 18:1-20:23—The portion tells the story of Jethro's visit to the camp of Israel, then relates the great theophany at Mount Sinai, where God gives Israel the Ten Commandments and invites the people to enter a special covenant relationship with Him.

MISHPATIM —Exodus 21:1-24:18 The first three chapters of this Torah portion deliver a legal code of laws and commandments that form a nucleus for the Torah's laws. The last chapter tells the story of how the people of Israel consented to keep these laws and entered into a covenant relationship with God through a series of rituals conducted by Moses.
