CORONAVIRUS TASKFORCE UPDATE

We've all been hearing the good news about infection rates decreasing, the number of hospitalizations going down and death rates dropping. Communities and schools are removing mask mandates and the light at the end of the very long tunnel is looking brighter. At Temple Beth Hillel, we continue to monitor the current environment, follow recommended best practices and make changes slowly and cautiously.

Each change that we have implemented and each policy that we have modified has come one step at a time. So, taking one step, we look towards the end of March as a time to make masking optional. You may choose to continue to wear a mask indoors; if you do, you are still protecting yourself, even if others around you are un-masked.

Once mask wearing inside the temple becomes optional, we anticipate waiting a few weeks, then returning to allowing snacks during religious school and providing food for Onegs and other events. One step at a time.

Remember that the N95 and KN95 masks are most effective in preventing the spread of the Omicron variant.

Remember that if you are feeling unwell or have tested positive for COVID, please stay home for five days after the cessation of symptoms. We'll be here for you when you are feeling better.

Remember that our ability to keep our doors open during this difficult time is largely due to our collective adherence to these careful protocols. So, please keep these protocols in mind as we recognize our progress thus far and join the Coronavirus Task Force in looking forward to a time in the not distant future when we can all be together, sharing in a Shabbat Oneg!

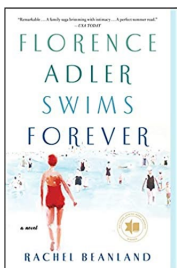

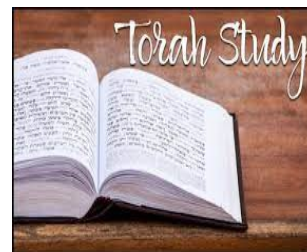

The positions of Past President, Men's Club President and Sisterhood President are not voted on by the congregation. All others are voted on by the congregation.

While you may show interest for any non-appointed position, the Nominating Committee has identified the following open positions:

Disbursements Treasurer

The Disbursements Treasurer is the administrator of the General Fund of the Congregation. This person basically disburses all funds related to the temple and reports on the financial status of the temple.

Receipts Treasurer

The Receipts Treasurer deals with anything related to receiving the funds for the temple including dues, donations, assessments, and fees due to the temple. This person also is the Chair of the Abatement Committee.

Secretary

The Secretary shall take and record minutes of all meetings of the Congregation and the Board of Trustees, deal with all congregational communications, and be the custodian of the Congregation's seal.

Development Committee Chair

The Development Committee is responsible for fund raising for the temple.

Membership Committee Chair

The Chair of the Membership Committee, with the committee, is responsible for promoting new membership in the Congregation, welcoming new members into the Congregation, and retaining existing members. The committee will also contact members who terminate their membership, in order to ascertain the reasons for termination. The Membership Committee meets monthly.

Cemetery Committee Chair

The Cemetery Committee's responsibility includes managing the temple's cemetery, issuing permits for burial, arrange for perpetual care, approve monuments, approve landscaping, and perform any other duties as delegated by the Board of Directors. Subject to approval by the Board, the Committee shall also establish regulations for eligibility, for the landscaping of lots and other space in the cemetery, and for the erection of monuments.

We look forward to having you join the dedicated group of congregants that have allowed us to have a temple we can all enjoy.

Update on South Windsor’s Efforts to Co-sponsor an Afghan Family

Due to large quantity of refugees to be placed in various Connecticut cities/towns, the Afghan refugee resettlement process in many Connecticut communities is taking more time than originally expected. The **South Windsor Refugee Alliance (SWRA)**, a community effort that includes local clergy, community leaders, and our TBH Social Action Committee is working with **IRIS-CT** on identifying housing, employment, education, healthcare, and much more. **We are very hopeful that a family will be relocated in South Windsor within the next two months...sometimes, there is less than one week’s notice.**

We welcome and need your input now, even before the family arrives. Please tell us if you know of:

Rental apartments or houses on a public transportation line. Contact [Rabbi Glickman](#).

Employers who would hire someone who doesn’t speak English. Contact TBH member Emily Cobbs.

TBH volunteers who can drive the family to appointments in the first months after they arrive. Contact [Laura Soll-Broxterman](#).

Individuals who speak Dari/Farci or Pashto who could help with occasional **interpretation needs** until the family is more conversant in English. Contact [Laura Soll-Broxterman](#).

Our South Windsor planning also includes raising funds to help with basic needs during the family’s first months. This includes rent, food, utilities, transportation needs, and more. **You can send a donation now OR make a pledge to help once the family arrives.**

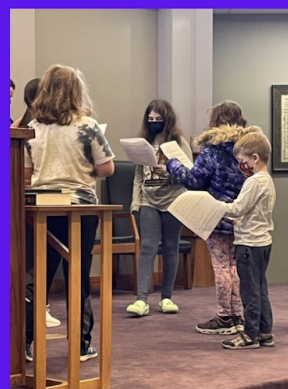

Legacy Giving Options

Your legacy gift of any size can be designed to match your personal and financial circumstances. Here are some suggested ways to leave your legacy.

Charitable Bequest in Your Will or Trust

Bequests can be made by will or revocable trust and can take a variety of forms, such as a specific amount, a percentage of your estate or a certain asset.

Life Insurance Policy

You can make charitable gifts of life insurance policies in several ways: Name the Foundation as a beneficiary of group insurance or individually-owned policies. Donate a policy that has been paid up. The donor names the Foundation as a beneficiary, and also transfers ownership of the policy. Donate a new policy or a partially paid up policy.

Designate as a Beneficiary in an IRA or Insurance Policy

These assets are directed by a separate beneficiary designation form, not by your will. Simply request the appropriate form for changing or adding a beneficiary and indicate the Jewish Community Foundation of Greater Hartford, Inc. as the beneficiary. Our tax ID number is 06-1372107.

Charitable Remainder Trust

You irrevocably transfer cash or property to the trust which creates two interests—an income interest for an individual beneficiary named, and a remainder interest for the Foundation. The income interest can be paid for the life of the beneficiary or for a term of up to 20 years. Upon the death of the income beneficiary, or at the end of the specified term of years, the balance of the trust assets is held by the Foundation in a named endowment fund. Trust payouts are either a fixed percentage of the trust assets or a fixed dollar amount.

Retained Life Estate

Donate your home and continue living there. Take a tax deduction in the year of the irrevocable gift, live in your home throughout your lifetime and your home will go to the Foundation upon your passing. The proceeds of the sale of your home will be used to create a charitable fund of your choosing.

Charitable Gift Annuity

A gift annuity is an agreement under which a donor transfers cash or securities to the Foundation in exchange for our promise to pay a fixed amount to the donor and/or another for life. The payout rate is determined by the age of the income beneficiary(ies) and currently ranges from 4.4% for a 60-year-old to 9.0% for a ninety year old. The older the beneficiary, the higher the annuity payment.

PEKUDEI— Exodus 38:21-40:38—The last reading from Exodus begins with an audit of how the contributions for the Tabernacle were used. The portion goes on to describe the completion of the Tabernacle and its assembly and concludes by depicting the glory of the LORD entering it. In most years,

VAYIKRA— Leviticus 1:1-5:26— This portion introduces the sacrificial service and describes five different types of sacrifices.

TZAV — Leviticus 6:1-8:36— The last chapter of the reading describes the seven-day ordination of Aaron and his sons as they prepared to enter the holy priesthood.

SH'MINI— Leviticus 9:1-11:47— The text goes on to describe the events of the eight day after setting up the Tabernacle, a phenomenal worship service followed by a tragic incident. The reading concludes with the biblical dietary laws regarding animals fit for consumption and prohibitions regarding those that are unfit.

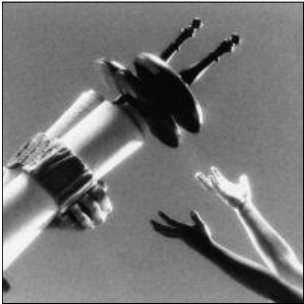
