CORONAVIRUS TASKFORCE UPDATE

Hello from your Coronavirus Task Force,

We're happy to report that infection rates and severe cases of Covid-19 have significantly declined these past few weeks, and we're going to begin making changes to the Temple's health and safety protocols.

Traditionally, we have stayed about a month behind the rest of the region when it comes to altering our approach, and that's paid off with our ability to reopen and *stay* open where other organizations have had to open and close, sometimes several times. We did not observe a spike in cases when masks became optional for public spaces and schools last month, so now we're ready to take that step at TBH.

As of now, masks are optional for everyone inside the building. This applies to services, events, and meetings, as well as Religious School activities. However, if you are not vaccinated, we do request that you wear a mask. TBH will never ask you about your vaccination status, but we do recommend you speak with your doctor about it.

N95 and **KN95** masks protect the person wearing them, and these styles of masks are recommended by the CDC if you are immune-compromised, have other health risks, or if you've chosen to continue to wear one. And on that note, choosing to wear a mask is a personal decision. Regardless of your choice, it will be respected. We still have a small supply of N95's if you forget to bring your own.

In addition to updating our mask protocol, starting on **Friday, April 8th,** we can begin having **pre-wrapped food** provided to individuals indoors. Naturally, anyone preparing food in this manner should continue to make hygiene and cleanliness their top priority. Even though we will **keep the kitchen closed for now**, we're so grateful that this means our **Oneg and other observances involving food can once again be an indoor activity**.

We certainly encourage everyone to participate in our Temple community to the degree they are comfortable, but we recognize that you might want to attend virtually due to health concerns. TBH will continue to stream services via Facebook as we've done for many years. Please communicate with the Religious Practices Committee if you have any questions or concerns around virtual services.

Lastly, our next task force meeting in mid-April will be used to make further decisions around health and safety measures and we'll discuss food and kitchen usage. Please stay tuned for those updates. As always, we try to balance the needs of our thriving Jewish community with the well-being of our members, families, friends, and guests. Thank you for your ongoing patience as we work to support TBH from the task force. Please don't hesitate to ask us questions or provide feedback.



The book this month is ... "The Ritual Bath" by Faye Kellerman. We have great discussions! Good to get together.



South Windsor's Co-Sponsorship of an Afghan Family

Within the coming two weeks, South Windsor expects to welcome an Afghan family to town! The South Windsor Refugee Alliance (SWRA), a community effort that includes Rabbi Jeff and Mindy, TBH's Social Action Committee, a number of Temple members, clergy, and other local residents, is working with IRIS-CT on a wide variety of elements related to housing, employment, education, healthcare, and much more.

We already have furnished an apartment for the family. When they arrive (and we know their sizes), we will ask for specific clothing [Please note that any additional household items we receive including furnishing, linens, clothing, etc. will be donated to our Shema Partner, The Walk in the Light Church of God].

We now are kicking up the call for:

TBH volunteers who can drive the family to appointments in the first months after they arrive. **Contact** Laura Soll-Broxterman.

Individuals who speak DARI (not Pashto) who could help with occasional **interpretation needs** until the family is more conversant in English. **Contact** Laura Soll-Broxterman.

Names of employers who would hire someone who doesn't speak English. Contact TBH member Emily Cobbs.

Our South Windsor planning group also is raising funds to help with the family's basic needs during the first months. This includes rent, food, utilities, transportation needs, and more.

TORAH PORTIONS

TAZRIA—Leviticus 12:1-13:59— Leviticus 13 introduces the laws for diagnosing and quarantining lepers. Except in biblical calendar leap years, Tazria is read together with the subsequent Torah portion, Metzora, on the same Sabbath.

METZORA—Leviticus 14:1-15:33 —Leviticus 14 spells out the complex purification rituals for the cleansing of a leper and a leprous home. Leviticus 15 briefly covers the laws regarding ritual unfitness stemming from bodily emissions. Except in biblical calendar leap years, Metzora is read together with the previous Torah portion, Tazria, on the same Sabbath.

PESACH—Exodus 12:21-51—The reading tells the adventures of the Israelites as they leave Egypt, cross the Red Sea, receive miraculous provision in the wilderness and face their first battle.

SHEMINI SHEL PESACH—Deuteronomy 14:22-16:17—On the final day of Passover, which commemorates the crossing of the Red Sea, there is a custom to end the season of redemption with an additional, less formal seder. Called Se'udat Mashiach, this event focuses on the ultimate redemption and the messianic banquet that will take place in the future

ACHAREI MOT— Leviticus 16:1-18:30—The twenty-ninth reading from the Torah and sixth reading from Leviticus is named Acharei Mot, two words that mean "after the death." The title comes from the first words of the first verse of the reading, which say, "Now the LORD spoke to Moses after the death of the two sons of Aaron" (Leviticus 16:1). Leviticus 16 describes the Tabernacle ceremony for the holy festival of the Day of Atonement. Leviticus 17 establishes general rules for sacrifice and sanctuary. Leviticus 18 lays down specific laws about permitted and forbidden sexual relationships.
