FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



My friend, Rabbi Manes Kogan of Hillcrest Jewish Center in Queens, NY sums up my thoughts beautifully...

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"We are all shocked, once again, by the terrible and tragic news.

Yesterday, an 18-year-old opened fire at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas, killing 21 people including 19 children. Earlier that day, he shot and wounded his grandmother. He also wounded around 15 children and a police officer before being killed. This was the 27th American school shooting in 2022, the deadliest since the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting in 2012, and the deadliest ever in Texas.

After such horrendous tragedies, different actors across the political, social and religious spectrum started issuing declarations and pointing fingers, all while trying to make sense of the senselessness.

On one end of the political spectrum, we hear renewed calls for banning assault weapons and for stricter background checks. On the other end we hear calls for arming teachers and keeping "weirdos" off the streets and communities.

According to classmates and friends, the shooter had a stutter and a strong lisp and was often bullied for it. He frequently got into fistfights with classmates, and had few friends. He was not on track to graduate from high school in 2022, as he was frequently absent from school. While many of us see the high price our society pays for dismissing or underestimating bullying, others, on the other end of the social and political spectrum, rush to point out the high price we pay for "letting in everyone," highlighting the fact that the shooter came from a Latino family.

Perhaps you heard of the Indian parable about the blind men and an elephant. It is a story about a group of blind men who have never come across an elephant before and who learn and imagine what the elephant is like just by touching it. Each man feels a different part of the elephant's body, but only one part, such as the side or the tusk, or the ears. They go on to describe the elephant based on their limited experience and their descriptions of the elephant are different from each other. In some versions, they come to suspect that the other person is dishonest and they come to blows. The moral of the parable is that humans have a tendency to claim absolute truth based on their points of view and limited and subjective experience, and they ignore other people's points of view and limited and subjective experiences.

Then on Sunday morning June 5th, come mark Shavuot and Yizkor while celebrating our Confirmation Class, followed by an Oneg. Switching gears, all TBH members should have received their packet of information regarding the annual congregational meeting. There will be an optional information session on Sunday, June 5th at 7 PM via Zoom for anyone who has specific questions. 
As always, if you feel more comfortable wearing a mask please do so. N95 and KN95 are the recommended types. We also want to remind everyone of our quarantine guidelines:







Less than two months ago, South Windsor welcomed a young family with a baby from Kabul, Afghanistan. Many TBH members have provided items, services such as driving, and funds to help them begin their new lives in America. Thanks to twice weekly language lessons, the parents' English skills are quickly improving, and the husband already has an entry-level job.

The **South Windsor Refugee Alliance (SWRA)**, a community effort that includes a number of Temple members, area clergy, and other local residents, is working with IRIS-CT on a wide variety of elements related to housing, employment, education, healthcare, childcare, and much more.

TORAH PORTIONS

BAMIDBAR Numbers 1:1-4:20 The first reading from *Bamidbar* and the thirty-fourth reading from the Torah begin with a census of the tribes of Israel and the Levitical families just prior to the departure from Sinai.

NASSO Numbers 4:21-7:89 This Torah portion finishes up the census of the Levites that was under way at the end of the last Torah portion, before going on to discuss the purification of the camp, the ritual for a woman suspected of adultery, the laws of the Nazirite vow, the priestly benediction and the gifts the heads of the twelve tribes brought for the dedication of the altar.

BEHA'ALOTCHA Numbers 8:1-12:15 This portion is jam-packed, telling the story of the consecration of the Levites, the first Passover in the wilderness, the silver trumpets, the cloud of glory, the departure from Sinai, the grumbling in the wilderness, the first Sanhedrin and the punishment of Miriam.

SHELACH Numbers 13:1-15:41 The Torah reading tells the tragic story of how the spies returned with a bad report about the Land of Promise and influenced the congregation of Israel to rebel against the LORD. Thus God consigned the generation of Moses to wander in the wilderness for forty years.

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
