Journey to Judaism, by Patrick Thomas

Growing up, I felt like I didn't belong in Catholicism, I did however strongly identify with teachings about Judaism in religious education. I also had exposure to people of the Jewish faith growing up and learned about their observance.

When I was 15, I decided I wanted to convert to Judaism. However I was a minor, and my mother said emphatically no. Due to the fact that she was my mother, I didn't pursue it further.

As the years went on, I did not observe Catholicism. I celebrated holidays as commercial ones without religious meaning. I began to again look for a faith where I felt accepted. Two years ago, I became very sick; and found myself with no place to turn spiritually. It was then I decided to talk to a Rabbi about converting to Judaism. When I met Rabbi Glickman, he did try to convince me not to convert. However I was persistent. He explained it would require a year of preparation on my part, which I was willing to invest for a conversion that I've wanted for 35 years.

The very first Shabbat service that I attended, I walked into the Synagogue and felt deep inside myself that I was home. A member approached me, handed me a prayer book and educated me about how to read it. To this day, this person remains very special to me.

During my journey, I've learned that I'm made in the image of God, that Judaism is a faith where I am welcome to take part in the community, as well as to come to worship. I've learned to live By the Jewish calendar and to observe Shabbat and the holidays. The most significant holiday for me is Yom Kippur. I learned not only to repent, I also learned to forgive myself as well. During this journey, I've had a lot of support and guidance from Rabbi Glickman, Cantor Harris, and the members of the Synagogue. All this support makes one realize, nobody converts to Judaism alone. There is no lone Jewish man, he is part of a community that supports one another. An example of this would be a member of the community, taking me into her home, treating me like a family member, and educating me on how to observe Passover. This would include what material to cover and what food to serve.

I have found a spiritual home in Judaism. A place where spirituality, community, and tzedakah are a way of life. This is the way I choose to live, because it demonstrates the person I want to become.

The parents' English skills are quickly improving, the **husband is successful at his entry-level job**, and the wife is painting many beautiful Afghan "calligraphy" art pieces like the one above.

Most needed are gently used or new Skillets and Pots for cooking and Summer and Fall Clothing:

▶ **Baby Girl clothes:** larger than 9-month-old size clothes.

▶ **Women's clothes for a young mid-20s mom:** **Tops and Jeans/Jeggings/Slacks** – Note that sleeves should be no shorter than the elbow (since modesty is important). She is just shy of 5 feet tall and tops are Medium or Large (Petite or Regular). Flowy tunics are best as she's still losing her pregnancy weight – and she loves color. Medium and Large Jeggings/pants with an elastic waist are best for now. **Gently worn sizes 6 or 6 ½ Flat Shoes with support, Sneakers, and Sandals** would be welcome too!

▶ **Men's clothes for a young mid-20s dad:** **Tee Shirts/Golf Shirts, casual button-down Shirts, Sweaters and Jeans/Slacks/Shorts** – Men's Small to Medium for all.

TORAH PORTIONS

DEVARIM—Deuteronomy 1:1-3:22- The book of Deuteronomy is dominated by Moses' farewell address to the children of Israel as he urges them to remain faithful to the covenant and prepares them for entering Canaan. During the course of the book, Moses reviews the story of the giving of the Torah at Sinai and the trip to the Promised Land, reiterates several laws of Torah and introduces new laws. The book seems to follow the general pattern of an ancient Near Eastern covenant treaty document.

VA'ETCHANAN—Deuteronomy 3:23-7:11 -The portion completes the historical prologue of the Deuteronomy covenant document and begins a rehearsal of the stipulations. Part of that rehearsal is a repetition of the Ten Commandments and the famous first passage of the *Shema*: Deuteronomy 6:4-9.

EKEV—Deuteronomy 7:12-11:25 -This portion of Deuteronomy speaks of the rewards that will come to Israel on the heels of keeping God's covenant and commandments.

RE'EH—Deuteronomy 11:26-16:17 -You shall not hesitate to give, nor murmur when you do give; because you shall know who is the good repayer of the hire. You shall not turn away from him that is in want, but you shall share all things with your brother, and shall not say that they are your own; for if you are partakers in that which is immortal, how much more in things which are mortal? (Didache 4:7-8)

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
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
