FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



Bird Vs. Worm

Birds have great vision. Perched up high, they can see for miles around. This is useful to scan the terrain and determine direction.

Worms can't see very far. Nestled in the dirt, they can barely see beyond the closest blade of grass. However, worms have amazing insight into the health of

the roots, the fertility of the soil and many other indicators of life.

Often we value the bird's eye view over the worm's eye view. They are both important. Perhaps the worm's perspective is harder to see, because you need to be right there.

That is a metaphor for what we are doing by showing up to remote places where the need is great. One of those places is Century, Florida. Century is in the panhandle section of western Florida, right on the Alabama border. Life is rough for the sixteen hundred residents: jobs are scarce, homes are small and falling apart, and they just closed the schools. There are 5 beautiful parks with baseball diamonds and football fields with bleachers, lights and dugouts.

I spoke at length with Larry, the head of the parks department. He told me many things. The kids don't come out to play sports like they used to; they are too distracted by video games. There isn't any money to fix up the sports houses or to hire staff; they get free labor from inmates at the nearby prison. I asked him for a story of a person who was a shining example of helping those in need, someone who could be an inspiration for people on the other side of the country. He thought for a long while. Even though he grew up in town and lived there all five decades of his life, he couldn't come up with a single example. He talked with pride about two boys who became famous in professional baseball and football. I asked if they remembered where they came from. He told me that he tried reaching out to them several times, but received no response.

From the money people gave us, I gave \$100 to Larry and told him he could use it for anything he thought was important but not on the budget. He was really and deeply touched. The money was unexpected, but just listening to him was the most important part of our visit.

SHEMA TOUR COLLECTIONS BEGIN FOR SOUTH PARK INN SHELTER

During a brief tour and meeting in February with leadership from Hartford's South Park Inn Shelter, we were told about their greatest needs and the variety of ways that TBH members can help to make an impact where most needed. Our first efforts will be collections, with other projects (including preparation of a meal and other onsite events) to follow in the coming months. Note that most of the 80 Guests are men (many veterans) with about a dozen women. Since COVID, no children have been living there.

You can bring any of the items below to services or events. Baskets & bins in the lobby.

► ALWAYS NEEDED for Shelter Guests:

Cans/Bags of Drip Coffee (not instant coffee) - Bulk size OK too

Bottles/Containers Powdered Creamer (not individual packets or cups) – Bulk size OK too

Bags/Boxes of Sugar (not individual packets) – Bulk size OK too

Men's Underwear(**NEW** in their original packaging)

Twin-Size White Sheets & Pillowcases (**NEW** in their original packaging)

Pillows & Blankets – Twin-size only (**NEW** in their original packaging)

Flip-Flop Slippers - Large and XL preferred (**NEW** in their original packaging)

► ALWAYS NEEDED for Guests Departing for New Homes:

NEW Kitchen & Bath Items including cleaning supplies, toasters, coffeemakers, mops, buckets, sponges, towels, laundry baskets, detergent, glasses, cups, plates, bowls, and mugs.

► TBH's SPECIAL MARCH TOILETRY COLLECTION – Later this month, TBH Religious School Students will Assemble Toiletry Bags for Shelter Guests and those starting new lives, so they are collecting all sizes of shampoo, conditioner, soap, shower gel, tampons, disposable razors, lip balm, toothbrushes, toothpaste and body moisturizer, including skin and hair products for their Black Guests.

We seek toiletries for this project by March 24th, and will keep collecting on an ongoing basis after.

► COLLECTIONS OF FOOD – We are awaiting a list of specific items they want and will share it with you. All other foods we receive will be given to Archbishop Burke for his North End community.

The South Park Inn only accepts new linens, household products and men's underwear.

► However, we will continue to donate all gently used items to Archbishop Burke and The Walk in the Light Church of God's community.

We **seek TBH members to help** with sorting/packing collected items for the Shelter, and others to drive the items to the shelter near Hartford Hospital. **Please let us know if you want to help in one of those ways**.

TORAH PORTIONS

TETZAVEH—**Exodus 27:20-30:10**—This Torah portion continues to narrate the instructions for the construction of the Tabernacle, focusing particularly on the priesthood that was to serve in that sanctuary. The Israelites are commanded to make special garments for Aaron and his sons to wear while ministering as priests. After describing the priestly garments, the portion concludes with instructions for the ritual inauguration of Aaron and his sons into the priesthood.

KI TISA—Exodus 30:11-34:35—The portion begins with instructions for taking a census, finishes up the instructions for making the Tabernacle, reiterates the commandment of Shabbat and then proceeds to tell the story of the golden calf. The majority of Ki Tisa is concerned with the sin of the golden calf, the breach in the covenant between God and Israel, and how Moses undertakes to restore that covenant relationship.

<u>VAYAK'HEL-PEKUDEI</u> —Exodus 35:1-40:38—This portion from the Torah describes how the assembly of Israel worked together to build the Tabernacle. In most years, synagogues read Vayakhel together with the following portion, Pekudei.— The portion goes on to describe the completion of the Tabernacle and its assembly and concludes by depicting the glory of the LORD entering it. In most years, synagogues read Pekudei together with the previous portion, Vayakhel; therefore, the comments on this week's reading will be brief.

VAYIKRA—Leviticus 1:1-5:26 This portion introduces the sacrificial service and describes five different types of sacrifices.
