Our students, families, Youth Group and faculty participated in some memorable Purim events (costume parade, Megillah reading, Purim carnival) a big success!!!



SHEMA TOUR COLLECTIONS FOR THE SOUTH PARK INN SHELTER

Our Temple's Religious School Students Prepare Personal Care Packages

Our wonderful Religious School students and faculty hosted Temple Beth Hillel's first focused collection effort for our new *Shema Partner*, **The South Park Inn** in Hartford. Throughout March, the students sought **donations of toiletries for men and women who stay one night or more in the shelter**. The girls and boys, along with other Temple members, donated shampoo, conditioner, soap and shower gel, disposable razors, lip balm, toothbrushes, and toothpaste.



The **students worked together and filled 61 colorful backpacks** with toiletries and also wrote notes of love, hope, encouragement, support to people in our area who do not have a home. They also heard from a guest who told of his personal experience living at a shelter.

This was a very special learning and community engagement day for the students. They shared their comments at the closing of the program, and it was clear the experience was very meaningful to them.

ADULT EDUCATION SPECIAL SPEAKER ON SUNDAY, APRIL 30

On Sunday, April 30th at 10 a.m., TBH is presenting an interesting award-winning speaker who will describe the course he teaches on genocide studies to high school students in Connecticut. This is a vitally important topic. The more we and our students learn about genocides in the past, the more power, we will all have to prevent future atrocities. Let us never forget the lessons of the holocaust and other worldwide atrocities!

We are intentionally scheduling this during Religious School hours so that parents and older students can attend, listen and learn.

Joe Goldman teaches at E.O. Smith High School in Mansfield, Conn. He has taught high school social studies for 12 years. In his last five years as an educator, Joe has taught a Genocide elective which focuses on issues of hate and human rights, The Armenian Genocide, Holocaust, Cambodian and Rwandan Genocides. His course features a focus on historical comparison, primary source analysis, and guest speakers who have witnessed first-hand the history studied. Joe has served as a member of the Yale Fortunoff Teacher Advisory Council for the past three years that has produced Holocaust curriculum that will be published on the Facing History site and used throughout the country as a teaching tool.

In the summer of 2016 and 2017, Joe taught a Social Studies Methods course as an adjunct professor at the University of Connecticut's Teaching Certificate Program for College Graduates. Before teaching, Joe worked in the Connecticut State Capitol as a clerk and assistant to the Senate President Pro Tempore at the time, Donald Williams.

In 2020, Joe was the project manager for a civics curriculum writing project that has been published on the Secretary of the State of Connecticut's website and shared with teachers across the state as part of the "My Election, My Vote" Initiative which is designed to support civics education across the state. Previously, Joe worked as staff on several State House and Senate campaigns and was the UConn Campus Coordinator for the Connecticut College Democrats to increase voter registration and voter turnout in the 2006 Congressional midterm election cycle. Joe's background in civics and government have formed the basis for a Genocide elective that includes civic engagement, citizenship, the study of the Weimar Republic and the contribution of political instability in Germany during the interwar period as a key element that allowed for the Rise of Hitler and the Nazi regime.

TORAH PORTIONS

TZAV Leviticus 6:1-8:36 The last chapter of the reading describes the seven-day ordination of Aaron and his sons as they prepared to enter the holy priesthood.

CHOL HAMO'ED PESACH Exodus 33:12-34:26 Passover begins on the 15th day of the month of Nisan in the Jewish calendar, which is in spring in the Northern Hemisphere, and is celebrated for seven or eight days. It is one of the most widely observed Jewish holidays.

SH'MINI Leviticus 9:1-11:47 The text describes the events of the eight day after setting up the Tabernacle, a phenomenal worship service followed by a tragic incident. The reading concludes with the biblical dietary laws regarding animals fit for consumption and prohibitions regarding those that are unfit.

TAZRIA-METZORA Leviticus 12:1-15:33 Where the LORD says to Moses, "When a woman [conceives] and bears a male child ..." Leviticus 12 discusses the laws of purification after childbirth. Leviticus 13 introduces the laws for diagnosing and quarantining lepers. Except in biblical calendar leap years, *Tazria* is read together with the subsequent Torah portion, *Metzora*, on the same Sabbath.
