The TBH community is poised on the brink of a singularly NEW year. 5784 will see the first ever completely Benamy led service anywhere, as my Sister-in-law, Cantor Annice Benamy, has accepted the cantorial position beside me on the bimah. She grew up in the Reform movement and is familiar with the prayerbook we will be introducing at Rosh Hashanah: Mishkan Hanefesh, which replaces Gates of Repentance. Yes, this is a lot of change in a short time. It will be a challenge to feel at home with so many different components this year. I am proffering the metaphor of a caterpillar for your consideration. This creature which has to go through a tremendous amount of change in a short time, emerges, after an undoubtedly difficult transition that necessitated significant and unforeseen change... as a butterfly.

Now, no offense to the animal phylum, but TBH is much more than a caterpillar at the moment! I envision no need for the walling off of a chrysalis, as this community does not need protection from an external threat. I urge all of you, every member of TBH, to look for the unfurling of delicate wings that I am confident will be evident this year. The revamped Religious School curriculum will provide a sure foundation for our children to achieve a level of Jewish literacy that will give them entrée as adults to our traditions and texts. I am certainly looking forward to inviting the oldest of our students to read from Torah on a Shabbat that will have special meaning to them and their families!

Our coming together as a community is most evident during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Sukkot and Simchat Torah come right on the heels of the "big two", and if the weather permits, gives us a wonderful opportunity to gather outside for a change. It may be the last such gathering until Hanukkah, I hope you will take advantage and join the celebration!

This is my theme for 5784 – come join the celebration at TBH! Bring your voice to the conversation and have an impact on the future of the congregation.

TORAH PORTIONS

Ki Tavo Deuteronomy 26:1-29:9 Ki Tavo ("When You Come") opens by describing the ceremony of the first fruit offering (bikkurim) and the declaration made upon the completion of tithing. It concludes with a detailed description of blessings that follow obedience to God's laws and curses that come with their desecration.

Nitzavim-Vayeilech Deuteronomy 29:9-31:30 In Nitzavim ("Standing"), Moses addresses the Israelites, emphasizing the importance of following God's covenant and of not worshiping other gods. He describes the process of repentance and returning to God, and stresses that God's commandments are achievable and "not in the heavens." Vayeilech ("He Went") opens as Moses tells the Israelites that he will not lead them into the Land of Israel, and that Joshua will take over. He instructs the Israelites to gather and read Torah publicly every seven years. At God's command, Moses writes a poem bearing witness to God's covenant with the Israelites.

Parashat Ha'Azinu Deuteronomy 32:1-32:52 Ha'azinu ("Listen"), Moses recites a poem praising God and criticizing the sins of the Israelites. He describes the misfortunes that the Israelites will face and the damage God will ultimately wreak on their oppressors. The portion ends as God commands Moses to ascend Mount Nebo, where he is to die.

Parashat Vezot Haberakhah Deuteronomy 33:1-34:12; Genesis 1:1-2:3; Numbers 29:35-30:1 V'Zot HaBerachah is the final portion in the annual cycle of Torah reading. In it, Moses blesses each of the tribes, excluding the tribe of Simeon. He then ascends Mount Nebo, sees the Land of Israel, and dies at the age of 120. The Israelites mourn, and the portion ends highlighting Moses' unparalleled greatness.
