# THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER

These past few weeks have been one of the most trying times in recent history. There is no doubt that we all have been touched by the horrific violence that is going on in Israel. It is even more troubling to see all the antisemitic rhetoric that is being spewed across the country. Needless to say, it is a very troubling time to be a Jew right now. At times like these, we need to bond and show our strength in our resolve as a community. We have decided that we at TBH will not hold any rallies or demonstrations. I know that some of you may not understand how we can do that at a time like this where it seems we are being attacked on all fronts. The Rabbi and I have had many conversations about this, and we feel that there are a lot of these events going on in our community already and we do not want to take away from them. We will continue to promote events for solidarity with Israel and I hope you attend them to show our support. Instead of hosting events, we hope you join us for meaningful worship. Our prayers are needed now more than ever!

The Jewish Federation of Greater Hartford, which we belong to, in conjunction with the Jewish Federation of North America are accepting donations to help our family over in Israel during this war. Some of the things they are helping with are medical supplies, evacuation help and food and assistance for those displaced. What is great is that they are working with agencies on the ground in Israel to be able to pivot to those most in need. Another thing that has been brought to my attention is questions about our Rabbinic Search. I wanted to let you know that the committee, comprised of a great cross-section of our congregation, has been working diligently to fill out the application and put our best foot forward. They have recently completed this application and after a final review, we will submit it to the CCAR (Central Conference of American Rabbis) to help us find some applicants.

The steps in the process are for us to apply, and then have applicants reach out to us for interviews. The committee will be interviewing those applicants (virtually over Zoom) and when we have some finalists, we will be bringing them in to meet them in person. This process is not a short one, but rest assured we will be doing our diligence to make sure we get the best candidate that fits the needs and wants of our congregation. 

# **Legacy Giving Options**

Charitable Bequest in Your Will or Trust — Bequests can be made by will or revocable trust and take a variety of forms, such as a specific amount, a percentage of your estate, a remainder allocation, or a certain asset. An attorney can update your documents to reflect your wishes.

**Life Insurance Policy** — You can make charitable gifts of life insurance policies in several ways. You can name the Foundation as a beneficiary or partial beneficiary of group insurance or individually-owned policies, or donate a new or existing policy that has been paid up. Your insurance agent can advise on the best options.

Designate as a Beneficiary in an IRA — These assets are directed by a separate beneficiary designation form, not by your will. Request the appropriate form from your IRA provider and indicate the Jewish Community Foundation of Greater Hartford, Inc. as a full or partial beneficiary. Our tax ID number is 06-1372107.

Charitable Gift Annuity (CGA) — An agreement under which a donor transfers cash or securities to the Foundation in exchange for our promise to pay a fixed amount annually to the donor and/or to another beneficiary — for life. The payout rate is determined by the age of the beneficiary/ies receiving income, and currently ranges from 4.4% for a 60-year-old to 9.0% for a 90-year-old. The older the beneficiary, the higher the annuity payment. The Foundation opens Charitable Gift Annuities of \$25,000 or more for donors ages 72 and above.

Charitable Remainder Trust (CRT) — Your irrevocable transfer cash or property to the trust creates two interests — an income interest for an individual beneficiary, and a remainder interest for JCF. The income interest can be paid for the lifetime of the beneficiary or for a term of up to 20 years. Upon the death of the income beneficiary, or at the end of the specified term of years, the balance of the trust assets is held by JCF in a named endowment fund. Trust payouts are either a fixed percentage of the trust assets or a fixed dollar amount. CRTs are generally best for larger gifts (generally \$100,000 or more), and can be set up through the Foundation or directly with a trust or estate lawyer.

Retained Life Estate — Donate your home and continue living there.

Take a tax deduction in the year of the irrevocable gift, live in your home throughout your lifetime and your home will go to JCF upon your passing. The home sale proceeds will be used to create a fund of your choosing.

# Legacy Giving Options (continued)

# How to Name Gifts to Support Your Wishes

- To contribute to an existing fund or create a new named one, donors should name the Jewish Community Foundation as the legal recipient (the organization named in legal documents, beneficiary designations, even personal checks) with a note or memo that designates the intended fund. For example, in a will, the designation would be "to the Jewish Community Foundation of Greater Hartford to establish an endowment fund to benefit [YOUR CHOSEN ORGANIZATION or CAUSE]."
- For those donors with multiple funds and/or directions for their Foundation gift, they may also provide personal written correspondence (not legally binding) with instructions for the Foundation. These instructions will be kept on file at the Foundation, and may be updated at any time without necessitating an attorney to revise the binding legal documents.

### Sample Language

To create a named fund to benefit a specific organization:

To distribute money into the organization's general endowment fund:

# **TORAH PORTIONS**

Vayera Genesis 18:1-22:24 Vayera ("He Appeared") opens as guests inform Abraham that Sarah will give birth. Despite Abraham's attempts to convince God otherwise, God destroys the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah. Sarah gives birth to Isaac, and Abraham sends away Hagar and Ishmael. At God's command, Abraham prepares to sacrifice Isaac, but an angel of God tells Abraham to offer a ram instead.

Chayei Sara Genesis 23:1-25:18 Chayei Sarah ("The Life of Sarah") opens as Sarah dies and Abraham buys the Cave of Machpelah to bury her. Abraham sends his servant to find a wife for Isaac. The servant meets Rebecca at a well, and Rebecca returns with the servant to marry Isaac. Abraham remarries, has more children, and dies at age 175.

Toldot Genesis 25:19-28:9 Toldot ("Generations") opens with the births of Isaac and Rebecca's twins, Jacob and Esau. Esau sells his birthright to Jacob in exchange for soup. Isaac and Rebecca travel to Gerar, where Isaac makes a peace treaty with King Abimelech. Isaac gives Jacob the blessing meant for Esau, and Jacob runs away to his uncle Laban.

Vayetzei Genesis 28:10-32:3 Ayetzei ("He Went Out") opens as Jacob dreams about angels going up and down a ladder, and then continues on his journey toward the home of his uncle Laban. During years of indentured servitude, Jacob marries Laban's daughters Leah and Rachel, bearing children with them and with their maidservants, Bilhah and Zilpah.
