From the Rabbi Emeritus' Study

Being Helpful

A short story I wrote based on a biblical miracle in 2 Kings 4. It gives a beautiful take on what it means to be a faith community.

Elisha helped many people. A woman came to him and said, "We have worked with you to help others, and now we are in need."

Elisha asked how he could be helpful and what they had in their home. She said that the only thing she had was a small jar of oil.

Elisha told her to borrow many empty jars, large and small, from her neighbors. She and her sons

collected the jars and brought them into their home. She poured the small jar of oil into the big jar, and it filled it up. Then her sons brought another and another, and they kept getting filled from the little jar! When there were no more jars, the oil stopped flowing. A good reputation is a treasure.

Don't be ashamed to ask for help.

It is good to be a part of helping yourself.

Start with what you have. It can be a seed which grows.

A good community helps people who are hurting.

The miracle ends at the limit of trust.

Trusting is a kind of helping.

Everyone likes to be involved in a great project.

[Here are the actual verses in Second Kings, Chapter 4]

- 1. A certain woman of the wives of the sons of the prophets cried out to Elisha, saying, "Your servant my husband is dead, and you know that your servant feared the Lord. And the creditor is coming to take my two sons to be his slaves."
- 2. So Elisha said to her, "What shall I do for you? Tell me, what do you have in the house?" And she said, "Your maidservant has nothing in the house but a jar of oil."
- 3. Then he said, "Go, borrow vessels from everywhere, from all your neighbors—empty vessels; do not gather just a few.
- 4. And when you have come in, you shall shut the door behind you and your sons; then pour it into all those vessels, and set aside the full ones."
- 5. So she went from him and shut the door behind her and her sons, who brought the vessels to her; and she poured it out.
- 6. Now it came to pass, when the vessels were full, that she said to her son, "Bring me another vessel."

And he said to her, "There is not another vessel." So the oil ceased.

7. Then she came and told the man of God. And he said, "Go, sell the oil and pay your debt; and you and your sons live on the rest."





An Important Issue Impacts Our Synagogue: The Financial Health of Temple Beth Hillel

We depend upon the income raised from membership dues, High Holy Days pledges, and Life & Legacy commitments to pay for essential costs which includes insurance, utilities, maintenance, security, and staff salaries. In the next two weeks, we will begin reaching out to members who are not meeting their dues obligations, including abatement agreements.

We are a family. It is only fair that everyone participates and contributes to help our congregation thrive. To quote from Mishnah Avot: אם אין קמח אין ("If there is no flour, there is no Torah"; meaning that while we would all like to have the opportunity to study, we must first meet our physical needs, such as eating. The budget of any organization supports its members' activities, and there is no price to the feeling we all get when we gather as a community.

Our bylaws state that you must be a member in good standing to receive these important benefits and privileges:

- Complimentary High Holy Days tickets
- · Honors on the bimah during weekly and High Holy Days services
- Bar/Bat Mitzvah preparation
- Enrollment in religious school
- Pastoral care (including officiating at life cycle events)
- Participation in Men's Club, Adult Education, Social Action events and activities, etc.
- Attendance at member-only events
- Opportunity for inclusion on the Tree of Life and Memorial Boards
- Discounted rentals of the temple space, including the social hall and kitchen for events
- Notification of Hillel Happenings, the Temple newsletter

You may elect to pay dues and fees on a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis. Options include paying by cash/check, credit card or automatic transfers from your bank account.

We understand that some may be managing challenges at home and might benefit from a temporary abatement (adjustment of fees) of your dues. All conversations are confidential. TORAH PORTIONS

Parashat Yitro Exodus 18:1-20:23 Yitro ("Jethro") begins as Moses reunites with his father-in-law Yitro and accepts his advice to appoint judges who will help govern the Israelites. The Israelites prepare to encounter God at Mount Sinai. God descends amidst fire, smoke, thunder, and the blast of a shofar and gives the Ten Commandments.

Parashat Mishpatim Exodus 21:1-24:18; Numbers 28:9-15 Mishpatim ("Laws") recounts a series of God's laws that Moses gives to the Israelites. These include laws about treatment of slaves, damages, loans, returning lost property, the Sabbath, the sabbatical year, holidays, and destroying idolatry. The portion ends as Moses ascends Mount Sinai for 40 days.

Parashat Terumah <u>Exodus 25:1-27:19</u> Terumah ("Donation") opens as God tells Moses to collect donated materials in order to build a dwelling place for God called the Mishkan (Tabernacle). God describes how to build the vessels that will fill the Mishkan - including the ark, table, menorah, and sacrificial altar - as well as the Mishkan's walls and curtains.

Parashat Tetzaveh Exodus 27:20-30:10 Tetzaveh ("You Shall Command") opens as God instructs Moses to appoint Aaron and his sons as priests. God details how to make the priestly clothing, how to sanctify the priests and offer sacrifices during the seven days of inauguration in the Mishkan (Tabernacle), and how to build the golden altar.
