TBH Info

In my first message to the TBH newsletter when I arrived, I quoted the Israeli singer/songwriter Leah Naor's poem, here translated. I wrote about an agenda of listening to what each member holds dear, and I have heard and seen much in the past year. I wrote that "the function of TBH as, ביתכנסת a house of gathering, has been fulfilled in its best sense already as we not only joined in prayer and Celebration," but went beyond that to improve life for others outside our own "family" and that is still true.

What I have observed in the past year plus with you, for some, not all, is also a willingness to accept change as not only a possibility, but as a necessity in order to not only maintain the community that is TBH, but work to sustain in for the future. I will use the metaphor of a garden as my frame for what I feel this coming New Year demands of us in order to achieve greater sustainability.

First, we must take stock of all that we have, recognize what soil is fertile, and what has been overworked and is no longer able to support germination of new ideas and direction, i.e. new growth. We must take stock of the tools we have available to us, the skills and talents of our dedicated volunteers. We must then carefully curate what we will plant, being aware that a congregation is many things to many people. Some previous plantings have withered, and there has already been some weeding out of programs or activities that had little active support of our current membership. A garden contains plants that may begin small and appear weak, yet if they are given the right environment to grow and flourish, they not only provide us with a delight for the eyes, its produce will sustain us physically. Gardening is dirty work, yet no other hobby is as rewarding to me!

The ultimate garden for me is one that is constantly changing in response to the seasons and the resources available. Every plant will die eventually and, just as in our Jewish tradition, we acknowledge that our human bodies in time will no longer serve us alive but will sustain the vitality of the soil and plants for generations after we are dead, so too the garden. If we are willing to winnow out what is no longer strengthening us as a congregation and throw it on the compost heap of past successes, we will be ready for the next stage: working together, with accountability and transparency, to tend to the essential needs of our TBH garden, nurturing a community that has already grown in ways that are not always visible on the surface.

Religious Practices Committee Oneg Update

Dear Temple Family,

As you all know, our Friday night Onegs are a wonderful way to reinforce our social connections and they are a vital part of our TBH community. We are reorganizing the way that we plan for these Onegs in order to make sure that we have support throughout the year. For this, we need your help.

In the past, we have assigned families to an Oneg date but, during COVID, this practice was suspended. Since services are back to being fully in person, we are returning to this practice with a few changes:

You may still choose an Oneg date that is the most convenient for you and you may also partner with other temple members to host that Oneg. If you are planning to share an oneg with another temple family, please consider choosing two dates during the year to host, so that we may be able to cover all the dates on our calendar.

If you do not want to choose a date, we will assign one to you. **If the date that you are assigned is not convenient, you have two options**: either switch dates with another temple family or financially support an Oneg for \$54. You will still be acknowledged as the sponsor of the Oneg during services, but our office admin, Sam, will purchase items to be delivered to TBH that will be used for the Oneg. If this poses a financial hardship for you, please contact Rabbi Leah.

We hope that this new system will allow our Onegs to be provided for our temple family without issues. We thank everyone for supporting the Onegs for the past few years as we recover from COVID.





New Credit card payment option available on the TBHSW website! (with no fee for you or TBH) What is Zeffy????



Zeffy is your new best friend!

It is a credit card payment system where the temple, as a nonprofit, does not get charged the credit card fee! This system has the potential of saving our synagogue thousands of dollars!

Who can use Zeffy?

Zeffy can be used by anyone with a valid credit or debit card

What can Zeffy be used for?

Zeffy can be used for one-time payments, such as a donation, purchases at the tag sale, bake sale, raffle and at any event where a fee is being charged. This payment system can also be used to make periodic payments.

When using Zeffy, please be sure to provide a note explaining the specific purpose of your payment i.e. dues/fees, general donation, a donation towards a specific fund, etc.

Where can I find Zeffy?

- 1. Go to the <u>www.tbhsw.org</u> website.
- 2. Select the "donate" page.
- 3. From the donate page, review the 3rd option and click on the word "Zeffy".

4. You should be sent to a page that asks for the amount of your donation, the purpose of the donation and your credit card information.

5. At any TBH event where you will be making a purchase (like at the tag sale), a "tap and pay" option will be available.

How does this work?

It works just like any other online credit card payment system. The only difference is that TBH does not get charged a fee, which is a huge savings to the synagogue.

Are there any fees to the credit card holder?

When making a payment from the TBH website, you are asked to contribute 17%-22% or "Other."

You do not have to make this additional contribution. This fee goes to the credit card company, not to the synagogue. Select "other" and enter \$0 to avoid this fee.
