HILLEL HAPPENINGS

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



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November this year, Jewishly speaking, is a time of beginnings, strange as that may sound. We have completed the month of Tishrei with its plethora of holidays, and, right at the end of the previous month, we completed the reading of Deuteronomy and began Genesis. The first few stories are GIANT in scope, literally mythic in their size and import: Creation, the Garden of Eden, Cain and Abel, Noah and the Flood, the Tower of Babel. Yet there are many, many more stories in Torah than these that are also fascinating and confounding which we don't read publicly, and few read privately.

At this time of great decisions for our country as a whole, let me ask you to explore something completely non-partisan: the project known as 929. As we will discover early in November, there are many things we can learn which we have not yet discovered in the area of political engagement. Any change brings uncertainty, and no matter the outcome of the election, there will be change. As a counterbalance to that change, I challenge us all to dip a toe into our most foundational text as Jews: The Hebrew Bible!

Here is a detailed explanation of the 929 project from Professor Marc Bregman:

Ilub/ Meetings12The current division of the Tanakh into 929 numbered chapters and verses may seem
to be an integral and original component of the sacred scriptural text. However, it turns
out that the numerically divided format of our Bible is a medieval Christian innovation,
usually attributed to <u>Stephen Langton</u>, Archbishop of Canterbury in his 1226 edition of
the Latin Vulgate.

Donations15There are, of course, other ways of dividing and citing the scriptural text. Most familiar
to Jews are the traditional weekly Torah portions (parashot, sidrot) according to which
the Torah is read in synagogue. This way of reading through the entire Pentateuch
according to an <u>annual cycle</u> reflects the ancient practice of the Babylonian Jewish
community that was eventually accepted in most of the Jewish world until today.TBH Info19TBH Info19

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY CONTINUED...

The earliest surviving manuscripts of Scripture, discovered at Qumran in the Dead Sea Scrolls indicate sense divisions in the Hebrew text by simply leaving spaces. The early Midrash on Leviticus, <u>Sifra</u> teaches that the "breaks" (hafsaqot) between the "sections" and "subjects" in the Biblical text were to give Moses time for reflection between consecutive parts in the flow of the Scriptural text. According to <u>Talmud Nedarim 37b</u>, the division of the Biblical text into readily understandable units goes back to the initial public reading of the Torah in the time of <u>Ezra and Nehemiah</u>. <u>Menachot 32a</u> mentions briefly the division of the Biblical text into "open and closed" sections to which <u>Maimonides</u> devotes an extensive Halakhic discussion. These <u>parashiyyot petuhot ve-setumot</u> are preserved in our Torah Scrolls. They are marked by the Hebrew letters peh (petuhah) and samekh (setumah) in the authoritative <u>Masoretic text</u> preserved in vocalized Biblical manuscripts and printed Hebrew Bibles to this day.

In addition to the "Rabbinic Bible" (<u>Mikra'ot Gedolot</u>), first published by the Christian printer Daniel Bomberg in Venice in 1517, a famous example of a printed Hebrew Bible is the edition published by the Jewish priner <u>Joseph Athias in Amsterdam in 1661 and 1667</u>, edited by the Christian Professor Johannes Leusden of <u>Leyden</u>. Upon its publication Athias was elected to the Amsterdam printer's guild, an unprecedented honor for a Jew. In 1667, the Dutch government presented Athias with a gold medal and chain, in recognition of his having produced a reliable text of the Hebrew Bible for study by both Jews and Christians.

The 929 Tanakh project provides a contemporary on-going forum for our exploring the Bible together regardless of religious persuasion.

Marc Bregman is the Herman and Zelda Bernard Distinguished Professor of Jewish Studies emeritus, at the University of North Carolina in Greensboro.






A Mitzvah at Temple Beth Hillel

TORAH PORTIONS

Parashat Noach Genesis 6:9-11:32; Numbers 28:9-15

Noach ("Noah") begins as God decides to destroy mankind with a flood. At God's command, the righteous Noah builds an ark, where Noah, his family, and select animals survive the flood. Noah's children bear children, and several generations develop. God confounds the speech of people building the Tower of Babel.

Parashat Lech-Lecha Genesis 12:1-17:27

Lech Lecha ("Go Forth") recounts Abraham's (here known as Abram) first encounter with God, his journey to Canaan, the birth of his son Ishmael, the covenant between him, his descendants, and God, and God's commandment to circumcise the males of his household.

Parashat Vayera Genesis 18:1-22:24

Vayera ("He Appeared") opens as guests inform Abraham that Sarah will give birth. Despite Abraham's attempts to convince God otherwise, God destroys the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah. Sarah gives birth to Isaac, and Abraham sends away Hagar and Ishmael. At God's command, Abraham prepares to sacrifice Isaac, but an angel of God tells Abraham to offer a ram instead.

Parashat Chayei Sara Genesis 23:1-25:18

Chayei Sarah ("The Life of Sarah") opens as Sarah dies and Abraham buys the Cave of Machpelah to bury her. Abraham sends his servant to find a wife for Isaac. The servant meets Rebecca at a well, and Rebecca returns with the servant to marry Isaac. Abraham remarries, has more children, and dies at age 175

Parashat Toldot Genesis 25:19-28:9

Toldot ("Generations") opens with the births of Isaac and Rebecca's twins, Jacob and Esau. Esau sells his birthright to Jacob in exchange for soup. Isaac and Rebecca travel to Gerar, where Isaac makes a peace treaty with King Abimelech. Isaac gives Jacob the blessing meant for Esau, and Jacob runs away to his uncle Laban.
