Mitzvah Mate Musings, part 2

Last month, the B'Mitzvah Committee shared what a Mitzvah Mate is, and explained a little about what the role involves. We shared a story from the Brezels, who have lovingly served as Mitzvah Mates to so many students over the years!

You may be wondering: Why would someone choose to become a Mitzvah Mate?

Part of the answer is right in the name! Serving in this role is, in itself, a mitzvah. Some people choose to become the Mitzvah Mate because they already know an 11 or 12-year-old b'mitzvah student from the TBH community and would like to partner with them! This could be a family friend, a neighbor, a former teacher, or someone you have met through social action projects. Doing mitzvot together can strengthen the bond between the student, the student's family members, and the Mitzvah Mate. Other people choose to become the Mitzvah Mate of a b'mitzvah student whose family they do not know! This is an opportunity for members of our TBH community to build new connections. While the main focus of the Mitzvah Mate is on the student, they are also a great resource for the family. This can lead to beautiful friendships that last well beyond the b'mitzvah year.

Regardless of whether or not our Mitzvah Mates knew their students before the b'mitzvah year, they describe this role as extremely rewarding. These Jewish adults paired up with students in order to give them **the benefit of their knowledge, and ended up receiving so much in return! Temple member Marla Adelsberger shares some words about Becoming a Mitzvah Mate:**

The best teacher in becoming a good parent is one's own child: pay attention to what they seem to need, keep them safe and kvell when things are going well. Similarly, if you have ever been a Mitzvah Mate, you know that getting to know your pre-B'Mitzvah student is a great way to learn how to become a good Mitzvah Mate. I have twice had the wonderful opportunity to serve as a Mitzvah Mate, once during COVID and once since then. Since our travels and possibilities for outings during the pandemic were limited, when Seth and I got together, we talked. I learned about the world of a twelve-year old, his interests, his frustrations, his joys and his dreams. I learned about the ways in which his Jewish identity is embedded in his family and in his temple community. I never felt that I had to present myself as the most observant person on the planet; I was honest, and that was enough. With my second student, Seth's younger brother, Evan, we focused on his passion for cooking and baking, expanding that to learning about hunger, food access and food insecurity. We

volunteered at a soup kitchen, we shopped for healthy, affordable food to donate to a food pantry, we harvested vegetables that would be donated to these organizations and more.

Both times, I thought of myself as more of a partner than a teacher in this process. As it turned out, I learned a great deal about these wonderful young men in their journeys to becoming active, engaged Jewish adults. As I watched each of them on the bimah at their Bar Mitzvahs, I felt a swell of pride, too. OK, I kvelled! If you are considering volunteering to be a Mitzvah Mate, or even if you never gave it a thought before, imagine a young teen having the opportunity to spend time with a caring adult who is not their parent or teacher. That adult could be you!





TORAH PORTIONS

Parashat Vayikra <u>Leviticus 1:1-5:26</u> In Vayikra ("He Called"), the first Torah portion in the Book of Leviticus, God tells Moses about the sacrifices offered in the Mishkan (Tabernacle). Among these are sacrifices entirely burnt on the altar, meal offerings made of flour and oil, peace offerings, and sacrifices brought for sinning inadvertently.

Parashat Tzav <u>Leviticus 6:1-8:36</u> In Tzav ("Command"), God tells Moses about the sacrifices offered in the Mishkan (Tabernacle), including a meal offering brought by the high priest, guilt offerings, and offerings of thanks. Moses initiates Aaron and Aaron's sons for priestly service in the Mishkan.

Pesach 2025 Passover (Hebrew: https://www.esach) commemorates the story of the Exodus, in which the ancient Israelites were freed from slavery in Egypt. Passover begins on the 15th day of the month of Nisan in the Jewish calendar, which is in spring in the Northern Hemisphere, and is celebrated for seven or eight days. It is one of the most widely observed Jewish holidays.

Parashat Shmini Shemini <u>Leviticus 9:1-11:47</u> ("Eighth") opens with the consecration of the Mishkan (Tabernacle). Two of Aaron's sons are consumed by a fire sent from God when they attempt to offer a "strange fire." God describes the animals, birds, and fish that are permissible and prohibited for consumption, as well as some laws of ritual purity.
