Religious School Update







WIN-WIN Solutions for Our Senior Members (QCDs, RMDs and Senior Citizens) By Joel Goldfarb

There is an easy way to donate to TBH while also saving money on taxes.

First let me disclose that I am not a Financial or Tax Adviser. This is just a "conversation" between friends. Please work with your Financial or Tax Adviser to learn how this information can benefit you and to be sure you are complying with all applicable laws.

I was advised by my own Financial Adviser to use a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) when making donations, including TBH dues. My Financial Adviser verified that payment of temple dues is an

acceptable use of a QCD. Therefore, you can reduce your tax liability by allocating your QCD and help in 2 different ways: 1) using the funds to make a straight donation to TBH; and 2) using the funds to pay your temple dues.

A QCD can be used by anyone over 70½. The financial advantage of a QCD is that it counts toward your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), the funds that you must withdraw from your IRA starting in the year you turn 73. (In previous years, the RMD started earlier). The best part is that the gains on your IRA distribution, if donated via QCD, are not counted as taxable income so long as the contribution is made directly from the IRA to the eligible charitable organization (such as TBH). You will still pay taxes on any nondonated portion of your RMD.

If you choose to use a QCD to contribute to TBH, or to any charity, be sure to have your donation properly documented. Each January, TBH provides this type of documentation by way of a summary sent to each member reporting all payments they made during the previous year. This letter details all payments made in the previous year..

Although you will receive a 1099 showing the full amount of the IRA withdrawal, to be considered as a QCD by the IRS, it requires special handling by the tax preparer. You will have to tell your tax preparer you used a QCD so that it is entered pursuant to IRS regulations. If you don't, your QCD may be just a part of your RMD and you will miss out on the tax advantages.

TBH will be receiving my yearly dues in one payment in the beginning of the fiscal year rather than spread out in monthly payments over the course of the year. The TBH Disbursements Treasurer can easily budget accordingly. As for my own cash flow, one payment is actually preferable since my dues will now come from the RMD that I have to withdraw anyway. Therefore, I no longer have to make a monthly payment which comes from other income.

In summary, if you are 70½ or older and making a charitable distribution via a QCD, you do not have to pay income tax on the amount of the donation. Additionally, if you are 73 or older and making a charitable distribution via a QCD the amount of the donation counts toward your yearly RMD, reducing your taxable income and your tax burden. A QCD donation may prevent you from entering into a higher tax bracket. Either way, you are supporting the temple in a meaningful way.

If there are other questions, please see me. Even though I am not a tax professional, I am happy to chat about this further. I'm usually available at the Oneg after Shabbat Services.



TORAH PORTIONS

Parashat Tazria-Metzora Leviticus 12:1-15:33 Tazria ("She Bears Seed") opens by describing the purification process for a woman after childbirth. It then describes different forms of tzaraat, a discoloration condition on skin or clothing, and the requirement of an infected person to dwell alone outside the camp and be inspected by a priest. Metzora opens by describing the purification process and accompanying sacrifices for one infected with tzaraat, a discoloration condition on the skin. It then describes the process of treating a house infected with tzaraat and the ritual impurity generated by certain bodily discharges.

Parashat Achrei Mot-Kedoshim Leviticus 16:1-20:27 Achrei Mot ("After The Death") opens by describing the ritual service of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement. It then details the prohibitions of offering sacrifices outside of the Mishkan (Tabernacle) and of eating animal blood, and ends with a list of forbidden sexual relations. Kedoshim ("Holy") opens by instructing the Israelites to be holy. It details dozens of laws regulating all aspects of life, including observing Shabbat, loving one's neighbor, and leaving portions of a field for the poor. It ends by detailing punishments for certain types of idolatry and sexual misconduct.

Parashat Emor <u>Leviticus 21:1-24:23</u> Emor ("Say") opens with laws regulating priestly behavior, working in the Mishkan (Tabernacle), and consuming sacrifices and priestly food. It describes the biblical holidays of Passover, Shavuot, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and Sukkot, and ends with a story about a blasphemer and his punishment.

Parashat Behar-Bechukotai <u>Leviticus 25:1-27:34</u> Behar ("On The Mountain") details the laws of the sabbatical year (Shemita), when working the land is prohibited and debts are forgiven. It also sets out laws of indentured servitude and of the Jubilee year (Yovel), when property reverts to its original ownership. Bechukotai ("In My Laws") is the final Torah portion in the Book of Leviticus. It begins describing blessings that follow obedience to God's laws and curses that come with desecration of them. It ends with laws of vows and consecration of people and property.

Parashat Bamidbar <u>Numbers 1:1-4:20</u> Bamidbar ("In The Desert") is the first Torah portion in the Book of Numbers. It describes God's command to take a census and details the camping formation of the Israelites in the desert. It also begins to enumerate the responsibilities of the Levites when transporting the Mishkan (Tabernacle).
